Mrs. Sterchi was seriously injured,

as was another of her daughters,

Dorothy Dunlap, aged 10. Both will

recover.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS OF BOND ISSUE

In the matter of determining to issue bonds of Adams county for the year 1923.

Notice is hereby given to the taxpayers of Washington township, Adams county, Ind., that the proper legal officers of said municipality at their regular meeting place on the 7th day of August, 1923, will consider the question of finally determining to issue bonds or other evidences of indebtedness, exceeding five thousand dollars and bearing interest not in excess of five per cent.

The amount of bonds proposed is \$20,240.00, bearing interest at 4 1/2 per cent.

The net assessed value of all property in this taxing unit is \$8,978,330.00 and the present total indebtedness without this issue is \$131,733.28, including issues issued concurrent with this issue.

The taxpayers appearing shall have a right to be heard thereon. Within fifteen days after the issuance of such bonds shall have been finally determined upon, ten or more taxpayers, or any two who pay poll tax only, who feel themselves aggrieved by such determination may appeal to the State Board of Tax Commission for further hearing. All appeals, however, for the county auditor, and the State Board will fix a date for hearing in this county.
