VISITOR'S DAY
AT FAIR SUNDAYActivities At Fair Ground
Increasing Rapidly; Exhibits Are Coming In

Activities at Belmont park, home of the Northern Indiana Fair, are increasing rapidly each day, as exhibits, attractions and concessions arrive by train, truck and wagon, to be ready for the opening of the big fair next Tuesday morning. Sunday will be visitors' day at the fair ground, and indications are that there will be plenty of attractions on the ground by then. There always has been a large crowd at the fair ground on Sunday before the opening of the fair and, no doubt, there will be hundreds there next Sunday.

Live stock exhibits are beginning to arrive. Several draft horses from Huntington and Wabash have arrived and are being cared for in the stalls at the fair ground. A few exhibitors have brought their poultry to the fair ground, already, also, and several exhibits have been placed in the Fine Arts hall. The domestic and fine arts exhibits and the agricultural exhibits, which will be an added feature of the local fair this year, promise to be a very interesting attraction.

Racers Getting Ready

Several lively races have been held on the track at Belmont Park already, the race horse trainers putting their steeds through fast practice heats. The track has been worked down until it is in fine condition. Word was received from Findlay, Ohio, this morning that there would be four race horses come here from the race meet there instead of thirty-six, as was stated yesterday. A telegram was received from Belding, Michigan this morning, also, stating that there would be about fifteen horses shipped from that city to the race meet here. Others are arriving daily, giving assurance that there will be plenty of entries in the speed program.

The big automobile and style show tent, centrally located near the midway, is ready for the opening and promises to be an attraction of great interest. The stage for the style show, which will be staged by E. F. Gass & Son, local ladies' furnishers, and Vance & Linn, local men's clothiers, has been erected. The style show is another big added attraction for the local fair this year. Professional models will display the fall and winter models of ladies' and men's clothing.

Many Attractions On Midway

Fall's circus and side shows will furnish the main attractions on the ever popular midway this year. In addition to the one-ring circus of acrobatic feats and animal acts, there will be glass blowers, athletic shows, midgets, two motordomes, ferris wheel, merry-go-round, whips and other rides.

NAME RECEIVER
OF DOLLINGS CO.Fiscal Brokers Placed Vol-
untarily In Hands Of
Receivers Today

(United Press Service) Columbus, Ohio, July 20.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—The R. L. Dollings company of Ohio, fiscal brokers and the International Mortgage and Note company, Dollings subsidiary, were placed voluntarily in the hands of receivers by Franklin county pleasure court today.

The following were appointed receivers of the two concerns and their bonds fixed at \$50,000 each:

William C. Willard, vice-president of the Huntington National bank; Samuel A. Kinnear, former Columbus postmaster, and Paul De Long, a certified public accountant.

Common Pleas Judge Duncan directed that the receivers make a thorough investigation of the two companies and report to him on their findings.

He deferred action on the receivership application for nine Ohio subsidiaries of the Dollings company which case he was to have heard today, until after the inventory of the parent company.

Petition Filed in Pennsylvania Philadelphia, Pa., July 20.—Three stockholders of the R. L. Dollings company of Pennsylvania, have filed a petition to have the company placed in the hands of a receiver.

The bill of equity for the appointment of a receiver was filed in the United States court here. Commissioners charged mismanagement.
