Phi Delt Officer Says  
Charges Are Not True

Connorsville, Aug. 2—Paul F. Deaton, of this city, national secretary-treasurer of the Phi Delta Kappa fraternity, a young men's organization which has a large Indiana membership, issued a statement today, declaring he has no knowledge of the fraternity being controlled by the Ku Klux Klan. His statement followed the announcement that Iota chapter, of Fort Wayne, had surrendered its charter as the result of the controversy regarding an alleged movement of the Klan to gain control of the organization's affairs.

Mr. Deaton declared that the controversy was the result of the defeat of Louis H. Dunten, attorney, of the Fort Wayne chapter, who was a candidate for the office of national vice-president at the recent convention at Dayton, O.
