ECLIPSE OF SUN ON SEPT. 10

Weird Spectacle Scheduled To Be Visible In Indiana During The Afternoon

If Monday September 10, is a day of clear skies in and around Decatur, the people of Adams county will be afforded opportunity to behold that always interesting and impressive spectacle, a solar eclipse.

On the afternoon of that day will

occur a total eclipse of the sun. The great shadow that will be caused by the moon coming between the earth and the sun will sweep across the North American continent. This part of the country, however, will not be in the path of totality. As seen from Decatur only a little more than half of the sun's face will be obscured.

The path of totality, according to John Candee Dean, who has furnished the Indianapolis News with a diagram showing the course the eclipse will take, will leave the Pacific ocean and cross the southwestern corner of California. So that San Diego, Point Conception, and the Santa Barbara Islands will see the sun totally eclipsed. From there the line swings into Mexico cuts in a southwesterly course across its upper section and passes on to the Atlantic ocean.

In central Indiana the eclipse will begin at 2:26 p. m. and will end at 4:22 p. m. The period of greatest obscuration will come about 3:30. The sun will be in a good position to be observed. When the eclipses begins it will be about half way between the zenith and the western horizon, and when the last trace be nearly two hour high.

In this article Mr. Dean says that the nearest approach of a total eclipse of the sun to Indianapolis, was on August 7, 1869. The southwestern part of the state was in the path of totality and a special train was run from Indianapolis to Greencastle to carry passengers to see the total phase.

"The line of totality, in the coming eclipse," says Mr. Dean, "will be a little more than 100 miles wide. It is must not be supposed that this line is a streak of darkness. The shadow of the moon on the earth's surface is a dark circular spot, a little flattened. This circular dark shadow, about 100 miles in diameter, moves eastward over the surface of the ground with the speed of a cannon shot, being about 1,050 miles an hour.

"During the eclipse the moon's globe, black as ink, is seen hanging in mid-air surrounded by a corona of silvery light such as is depicted by painters around the heads of saints. Besides this crown, tongues of rose colored flames of fantastic arms shoot out at many points from behind the black moon. Some minutes before the totality the weird darkness begins to be felt, and the light of the corona is altered to an electrical effect. Animals are perplexed and fowls go to roost."
