State of War is Declared in Barcelona

today discussed the situation in Catalonia and a report from the captain general of that district, who urged that in case martial law was declared it would be better not to cut communications.

The captain general also asked that the king dismiss the whole cabinet for the sake of the country and demanded the court give assistance to the garrisons in other provinces.

The cabinet has decided not to abandon power unless forced to do so.

The king is due to arrive in Madrid today.

Madrid, Sept. 13—(Special to Daily Democrat)—An extra edition of *El Sol* at noon today said the Madrid garrison will assist an armed movement started by the troops in Barcelona.

General Cavalcanti, in a statement to the press, said the movement was no mere flare-up but had been carefully planned in all its details and possible consequences.

The general said the movement was aimed against the "ruling politicians."
