

## Kenneth Shafer Attending College At Wooster, Ohio

Wooster, Ohio, Oct. 24.—Although the College of Wooster stiffened its entrance requirements considerably this fall and refused admission to pupils ranking in the lower third of their respective classes, there was no decrease in enrollment, according to figures made public by Registrar Charles R. Compton.

Seven hundred and ninety students have registered for the winter term, the same number as entered last year when the college saw the largest enrollment in its history. There is a decided increase in the number of men enrolled this fall, and a slight decrease in the number of women students.

Among the students registered at Wooster this fall is Kenneth Shafer, 908 W. Third street, Decatur, Ind.

Students come from 27 different states and ten foreign countries.

China sends six students; India three; Korea two; Brazil three, and England, Japan, Gautamala, Columbia and Chile, each one.

Twenty-eight lines of work are represented in the life purpose of Wooster students, according to information gleaned through questionnaires submitted to students at registration. Almost 45 per cent of them are planning on entering the teaching profession, and 14 per cent are preparing for the ministry and missionary service. Next to these come medicine and business with 10 per cent each, and law and engineering follow with 5 per cent. The list of vocations included social service, art, music, farming, forestry, chemistry, nursing and mechanics.

## Nickel Plate Shows Big Increase In Business

Analysis of the freight operations of the Nickel Plate road shows an increase of more than thirty-three per cent in the total revenue freight tonnage handled by that road during the first seven months of this year as compared with the corresponding seven months of 1922.

This is the most comprehensive analysis of the Nickel Plate's freight performance issued since the consolidation was effected and covers a period which has been marked by unprecedented traffic levels for the railroads generally. It shows a total volume of 15,363,967 revenue tons transported from January 1 to July 31 last, this being an increase for the Nickel Plate of 4,614,109 tons over the same period last year. Of this increase the products of the mines alone accounted for 2,696,905, or considerably more than one-half the tonnage preponderance over the seven months of 1922.

The increase in manufactures and miscellaneous commodities is given as 1,355,753 tons; the increase in forest products, 356,567, and the increase in animal products carried, 100,700 tons.

The figures are of interest chiefly as indicating the enlarged service capacity resulting from the consolidations.
