Chamonix, France, Feb. 1.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Canada's great hockey team became a finalist for the Olympic championship here this morning by defeating England 19 to 2, in the first of the semi-final matches.

Being the heavy favorite for the championship, the victory of the Canadians over England was expected but there was some great surprise when the English were able to score two goals.

It was the first time in the championship tournament that the Canadians had been scored on.

Three Murderers Awaiting Execution Escape Jail

Little Rock, Ark., Feb. 1.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Three gunmen and murderers awaiting electrocution at the state penitentiary here, escaped today. They overpowered and kidnapped Warden Hamp Martin, fleeing in his automobile.

The warden entered the "death cell" to talk to the prisoners—Emory Connell, Joe Sullivan and Eulos Sullivan—when the three attacked him. They were armed with revolvers and shotguns which had been smuggled into the prison. They bundled the warden into his automobile and made their escape past prison guards.

The craft sank during the night when heavy ice flows tore a huge hole in her hull. The boat settled on a sand bar, keeping the top deck above water.
