Preparing To Re-open Tomb Of King Tut

Luxor, Egypt, March 6.—Luxor was gay with flags and bunting in the Egyptian national colors today and crowded with sightseers and natives and distinguished visitors here for the Tut-Ankh-Amen under government official reopening of the tomb of King Tut. Three luxurious fitted special trains arrived from Cairo bringing members of the government who came to pay their respects at the shrine of one of Egypt's first rulers. Two hundred notables including Viscount and Viscountess Alenby, the duke and duchess of Aosta and virtually the entire diplomatic corps came along.

No Old Auto Licenses To Be Seen These Days

Not a single automobile bearing a 1923 license plate has been seen in the city since March 1. Chief of Police Joel Reynolds stated today. The chief has been keeping a close watch for the old license plates, as he was instructed to arrest all auto owners who operate their cars without the new license after March 1.
