of \$643.65, Miss Patton reported.

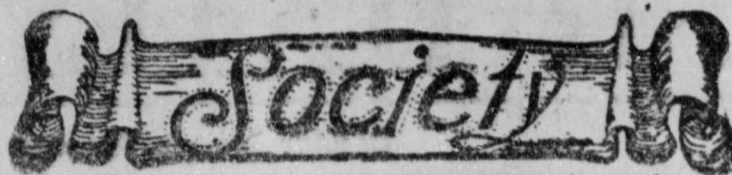

at her home on North Second street.

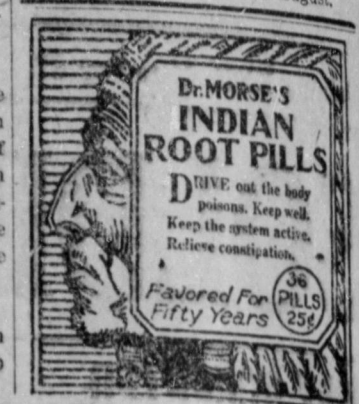
The Odd Fellows will have a card
