CANDIDATES PREPARING FOR WHIRLWIND FINISH
Indianapolis, Mar. 25—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Candidates for the major offices in the Indiana primaries are preparing for a whirlwind finish. The election is less than six weeks away, and few of the candidates have made any extended speaking tours.

Mayor Shakk, of Indianapolis, candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, and Dr. Carleton B. McCulloch, democratic candidate, have already covered the state rather thoroughly.

Dale Crittenger, Anderson, another Democratic candidate, has been active but has not yet opened state headquarters. He plans to open an office at the Claypool here next week.

Although Ed Jackson, Republican gubernatorial candidate, has not started his speaking campaign, he is arranging a strenuous schedule that will carry him to every part of the state next month.

Senator Joseph Cravens, Democrat, and Edgar Buch, and Ed. C. Toner, Republicans, have had headquarters and have been campaigning for some time.

The gubernatorial contest this year is different from any campaign since the primary law became effective. The number of aspirants in each party make the chance of a selection at the primaries almost out of the question, and candidates are directing their energy toward capturing votes to the state convention.

In striking contrast to the hot presidential primary race of four years ago, there is little interest in that phase of the race this spring.

Samuel M. Ralston will be unopposed in the Democratic race. The Republican race is between President Coolidge and Senator Hiram Johnson.

Since Johnson has thus far failed to show much speed in other state primaries, it is generally believed that President Coolidge will be assured the support of the Indiana delegation at the Cleveland convention by a substantial majority, in the primary.

There is considerable activity at the Coolidge headquarters here, and while his workers express themselves as confident of an easy victory, they are building up their fences just as rapidly as if they expected a close contest.
