Is the Character of Mark Sabre In "If Winter Comes" Christlike?

Dr. R. J. Pirkey, pastor of the Broadway Baptist church, Louisville, Kentucky, in a recent sermon, said: "You have met 'Old Sabre,' under another name perhaps, and you have thanked God for knowing such a man."

"He had a moral standard, patterned after the message of the Son of God. When Nona in her weakness came to him, he lifted her by the very power of his ideals into strength. She thanked him afterward. You are thrilled at the very power of a life like that."

"Any country which has not men like Sabre is doomed. Countries grow by ideals, not armies."

Taking as the subject of his sermon "The Christianity of 'If Winter Comes,'" Dr. S. G. Bland, Methodist minister, spoke at the Broadway Methodist Tabernacle, Toronto, Canada. Here are a few striking sentences from the talk of the noted preacher:

"It is close to the heart of Christianity. I humbly bow myself before the man who could conceive such a Christlike thing as Mark Sabre did."

"The thief characteristic of Mark Sabre was his constant effort to see some good in the other fellow, to get the other fellow's point of view. We need more of that. We need a baptism of spirit that will try to understand the other fellow."
