Washington All Excited Over Success Of Team

(United Press Service) Washington, Sept. 30.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Transformed from the staid and dignified capital of a great nation into a wildly excited main street town, Washington was in a college campus frenzy today over the success of the Washington Senators in winning the American league pennant.

Rain which has drenched the city for 36 hours was still holding out but it failed to dampen the enthusiasm of the town or to restrain the demonstrations of pride in the success of Washington's first pennant.

The weather bureau warned that the downpour might continue through the week and that a tropical storm might arrive from the gulf region on Saturday, but the city went ahead with plans to give the team a royal welcome when it returns Wednesday night and to see the first two games of the series.
