White Sox Retain Chicago City Title

Chicago, Oct. 7.—The White Sox remain Chicago champions, even if they did finish last in the 1924 American League race. Bowling over the Cubs today, 5 to 3, the American League nine led the Johnny Evers, retained their city title, won last year from the National Leaguers, after a lapse of 12 months.

It was the sixth game of the series the Cubs having captured the first and fifth combats solely on the pitching of Grover Alexander. In all the other contests the Sox's pitching and attack were superior.

Hollis Thurston and Ted Lyons hurled the Sox to victory Monday. Thurston was swept aside in the torrid Cub attack in the seventh inning which fell a single run short of tying the score and Lyons came on to wind up the fray.

The National League club could not catch the Sox after they got away to a four-run lead in the first three innings on Vic Aldridge. Of the players' share in the receipts which amounted to \$31,990.68, the White Sox will divide \$19,194.41, and the Cubs, \$12,796.27.

Indiana Team Preparing For Louisiana Contest

Bloomington, Ind., Oct. 7.—All efforts this week of coaches and players of Indiana University will be centered toward preparing for the inter-sectional contest with the Louisiana state university eleven, at Indianapolis, Oct. 11. Coach Ingram has a number of tricks up his sleeve that will be brought forth when the "Scrappin' Hoosiers" take the offensive. The day has been designated as "Dixy Day" and Indianapolis will be decorated for the occasion. The game will be played at Washington Park.

The Southerners, coached by Mike Donahue, former Auburn mentor, and will be famous for the powerful lines that the Georgia school turned out while under his tutelage, is coaching the Pelicans. Having had 26 more practice sessions than the Indiana team, the Donahue's men have had a splendid opportunity to get into mid-season form. The Rebel line averages 194 pounds and the backfield averaging 168 pounds, is regarded of ideal weight and speed.

While the "Scrappin' Hoosiers" have played two games this season, the full strength of the Crimson is expected to be developed in the encounter next Saturday. Coach Ingram will devote himself to teaching the players new formations and plays and these will be in evidence when the Hoosiers take the offensive. The first backfield will be composed of Lorber, quarterback; Sloate and Marks, halves; and Zivich, full. Coach Ingram will have two teams of reserves to shove into the game when occasion demands.

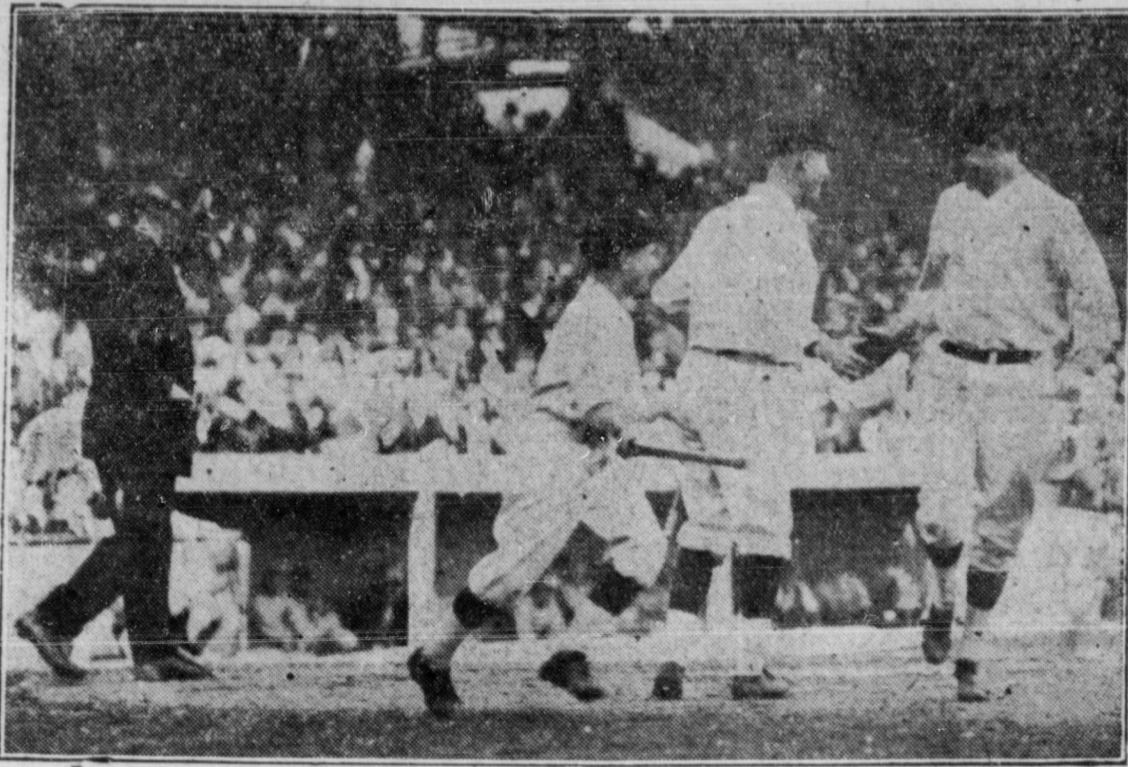

Marshall Becomes Football Coach: Kennedy Starts Basketball

A change in the athletic coaching staff of Decatur high school was announced yesterday evening by M. F. Worthman, superintendent of the city schools. Coach Maurice Kennedy, who has been head coach of the football team, will devote his entire time to basketball from now on, he holding the first practice session in the high school gymnasium last night. T. E. Marshall, science instructor in the high school, who has been assisting with the football team this fall, will be head football coach for the remainder of the season. Marshall took charge of the squad yesterday evening. He will be assisted by George Wittgenfeld, ex-D. H. S. star who has been helping coach the squad all fall, and Ralph Tyndall, history teacher in the high school.

Prospects for a strong basketball team during the coming winter are fairly bright at present. Although several candidates for the basketball

team are members of the football squad, there is a large number of other youths who will begin practice at once and will be in good physical condition by the time the football season is over. Coach Kennedy was highly successful in coaching basketball last season, he being coach of the Jefferson high school team near Frankfort, which gained statewide attention through its stellar playing.

The basketball schedule is almost completed and will be announced soon. The first game will be played on November 28 in all probability, two weeks after the close of the football season.

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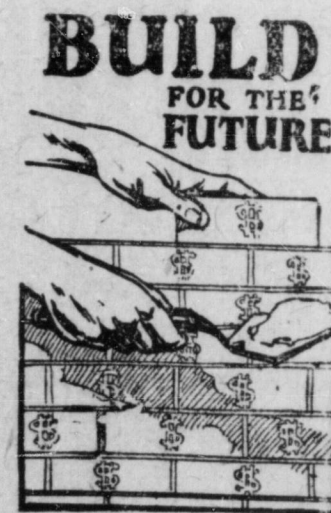
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
