Chicago, Nov. 14.—Grain prices opened irregular on the Chicago board of trade today.

Wheat was unchanged to fractionally higher, deriving some strength from President Coolidge's statement last night in which he warned of serious food shortages. Crop reports from Argentina were again unfavorable, adding slightly to the bullish spirit.

Corn suffered from the heavy profit-taking during yesterday's session and prices were unchanged to lower. Trade was slow.

Oats lacked individual pressure either way and prices were unchanged to fractionally lower in sympathy with corn in a dull market.

Provisions were dull and weak.


