The Auburn high school boys and girls basketball teams scored a double victory over the Decatur teams last evening, the visitors defeating the Decatur high school boys by a score of 33 to 30 and the Auburn girls winning their game 10 to 9. The games were played at the high school gymnasium and a large crowd of fans was present.

The boys game proved to be a rather dull affair and lacked the usual amount of interest until near the close when the locals staged a rally, but failed to overcome the big lead held by the visitors throughout the contest.

The Auburn tossers jumped into the lead early in the game, dropping the ball through the ring for a count of nine points before the locals scored. The locals then registered several markers in quick succession but were still trailing at the half way period with the score standing 19 to 13 in favor of Auburn.

The visitors again started to score at the opening of the second half but were soon stopped and the locals took their turn at putting the ball through the ring. They again registered several baskets in quick succession which brought the crowd to their feet and started the first real noise of the evening. From here on in the game was fast and furious but the time was too short and the locals were trailing by a three point margin when the final whistle sounded, Auburn holding the long end of a 33 to 30 score.

The contest between the Auburn girls and the local high school ladies proved to be a thriller, Auburn winning by one point. The Auburn girls started the scoring at the start of the game and were leading at the end of the first half 8 to 4.

The locals came back strong the second half and displayed real fighting blood tying the score at 8 to 8, at the close of the third quarter. The score was again tied, 9 to 9 and the throw awarded to the visitors near the close gave them the victory.

Indiana - Purdue Battle In
Final Act—Notre Dame
At Chicago

Indianapolis, Nov. 22—(United Press)—The last act of the 1924 Hoosier college football drama was played today. The curtain went down as bitter rivals met bitter rivals argued to have the last word.

The bitterest of all bitter rivals were Indiana and Purdue which met at Lafayette for the state championship—outside of Notre Dame. Wabash and Depauw met to have it out at Greencastle.

The struggle for the year was just as good as ever for Notre Dame when they got rid of their two-year enemies in defeating Nebraska last week. About the only argument about the

game between the Irish and Northwestern game at Chicago was whether the Purple would hold their opponents to as low a score as did Nebraska.

Northwestern fans pointed out that they held the heavy Chicago line from scoring a touchdown and that they can stop the Irish. The Purple team also is said to be in better condition than it was when it met the Maroons.

Northwestern has shown more speed this year than it ever had in the past.

Dopesters were expecting Purdue to come out on top in the game with Indiana. Attention of football fans was centered on this game today. Out of 24 games played by the two teams since 1892 Purdue has won 12 and Indiana 9. Three of the scores were tied. Purdue has lost to Indiana during the past four years but has had a better record than the crimson during the season. Chicago won from Indiana by 23 points while it defeated Purdue by only 13. Northwestern defeated Indiana by 10 points while the Boilermakers were victorious over Northwestern by seven points. The score of both Hoosier teams were 21 to 7 in defeating Wabash. The Boilermakers defeated Depauw 36 to 0 while the Crimson defeated Depauw 21 to 0. Indiana was the victor in the game with Ohio State while Purdue was the vanquished. It also won from Rose Poly with a higher score than did Purdue but it has the defeat delivered by Louisiana that it cannot wipe from its record.

The Boilermakers were on the lookout for Salmi, Sloats and Lorber, the best of the Crimson ball carriers and were prepared for them. The team has had two weeks to rest and have had time to let their men recover from injuries. Captain Claypool was still in a partially disabled condition and was not expected to be put into the game.

Wabash stacked up with a record for the season of 75 points ahead of Depauw and, according to dopesters, had a better chance of winning than the latter team. The Tigers have lost all but one game while the little giants have won three. Depauw, however, has been getting better each week and promised a few surprises.

The Haskell Indians after a two weeks rest were in splendid condition when they met Butler on Irvin field here. Levi and Captain Carpenter were out with injuries, however. Every man on the Bull Dog team was in good condition but it was indicated Hal Griggs, who has just recovered from injuries would not be used.

A meeting of the heirs here has been held to file claims for the estate. The litigation claims property in New York city on which giant skyscrapers, Old Trinity church and its ancient graveyard now stand.

John J. Hawkins, who settled in Jay county in 1829, was grandson of the late Joseph Hawkins, who married Annette Jane Edwards, sister of Capt. Robert Hawkins, of the British army who left the estate, it was claimed.

John Hawkins resided on the Hawkins farm about seven and one-half miles southeast of the city.

Mrs. Gertrude Fulton, of this city, claims she is a direct heir and other heirs are James Maxwell, Jennie Votaw, James Simmons, and James S. Hawkins, of Lake View, Mich., formerly of this city, and many members of his family here, and the Benjamin Hawkins families.

The suit has been instituted in the probate court of New York to settle the ancient claim based in a ninety-nine year lease given by Robert Edwards in 1778 and said to have been renewed in 1877.

The original lease included seventy-seven acres and a fraction leased to John and George Cruged "for one thousand pounds and a paper of corn."

Suggestions To Water Customers

Meters

Water meters are furnished by the Water Department but the consumer is required to keep the surroundings of the meter clean, dry and of easy access and protect the same from freezing. All damage done to the meter by freezing or by hot water poured on or forced back through the meter is charged to the consumer.

PROTECT YOUR METER TODAY.

Frozen Pipes and Meters

If pipes are frozen they may be thawed in some cases by wrapping cloths around them and pouring hot water on. If there is a bad case of frozen pipes or if a house is to be closed for the winter it is best to secure the services of a competent plumber.

Do not pour hot water on the meter; do not build a fire on the meter as it will ruin the rubber piston and celluloid register. In case of a frozen meter call this department before the same thaws out and causes a damage to your property and a waste of water.

Sill Cocks for Sprinkling

Sill cocks or house faucets on the side of the house should be shut off in the basement before freezing weather and when this is done, the faucet should be opened so as to admit air, which will cause the water to run out at the stop and waste in the basement. This procedure should be followed when it is desired to drain the house pipes. Air must be admitted at the top to force the water out below.

Tests of city water are furnished the State Board of Health and their analysis and report is on file in the office of the City Clerk for your inspection.

Water Closets and Faucets

Water closets and faucets should be examined frequently in order to keep the consumption of water on a normal basis. After a closet has been flushed and the tank is filled, there should be no movement of the water in the bowl; if there is, water is wasting into the sewer. By holding a piece of paper or cardboard against the rear portion of the bowl, a flow may be detected which an ordinary examination would not disclose.

STOP ALL LEAKS PROMPTLY as "a waste of water is a waste of money."

How to Shut Off Water

The "shut off" known as the stop and waste, where the pipes enter the basement is your immediate protection in the event of a burst pipe or meter and also for the purpose of shutting off and draining the house pipes where and when there is danger of freezing; it should be easy of access and in good condition. In some basements it is covered with coal or it is in such bad condition that it cannot be turned. The man of the house should see that the stop and waste is in good order and that the folks at home know how to operate it. To shut off turn handle so that it is at right angle with the pipe, one-quarter turn or if a wheel valve turn to right until completely closed.
