Several Adams Co., Farmers
Plan To Attend Conference At Purdue

Plans for the Indiana Agricultural Conference, formerly known as "Farmers' Week," to be held at Purdue during the week of January 12 to 16 are practically completed, according to information received at the county agent's office this morning. Steam and electric lines have granted special reductions in fares to people attending the conference, tickets going on sale January 10, good for return from Lafayette not later than January 19, at the rate of one and one-half fare for the round trip.

A large number of leading agricultural and home economics workers of the United States and Canada have been secured for the occasion and those attending are assured an educational and inspirational program which will keep them busy from morning until evening. Sessions will be held each evening.

The State Corn Show and State Potato Show will bring out one of the largest exhibits ever seen at Purdue. In spite of the relatively poor corn season, there is an unusual interest in seed corn and seed potatoes. The State Boys' Corn Club show will be held at the same time.

Several farmers from Adams county are planning to attend and at least one sample of corn will be sent down for the boys' corn show. Bulletins and programs of the conference may be obtained at the county agent's office.

Outline Plan To Avert Crossing Accidents

Indianapolis, Jan. 5.—The state advisory committee appointed by Governor Branch to co-operate in the reduction of grade crossing accidents in Indiana, met here today to outline its program.

The committee was appointed to co-operate with Frank E. Singleton, member of the state public service commission and who has been appointed state commissioner of safety. Singleton was in charge of the safety conference which was held last October on a call by Governor Branch to eliminate grade crossing accidents which after time, has been increasing at an appalling rate.

The committee is composed of seven members representing the various branches of traffic, education,

civic organizations, the farmers, and state highway commission. The committee is to serve without pay.

The committee, now however, has no legal status and it is expected that it will draw up a recommendation for the presentation to the next legislature for the establishment of a permanent committee.

Object To Pastor Going Into Highways and Byways

Chicago, Jan. 5.—Because the Rev. Thornton A. Mills associated with "publicans and sinners" and went into the "highways and byways" in search of church members, a fight has been started in the aristocratic New England Congregational church here which may end in the pastor's resignation.

In addition to the charge that he was bringing "undesirable" people into the church, opponents of the Rev. Mills claim he is a modernist. His Christmas sermon, they say, virtually repudiated the virgin birth of Christ.

The edifice is the mother church of Congregationalism in Chicago, with a baptismal font claimed to have been used by the Pilgrim fathers, and members of "old and distinguished American families" on its rolls. The church's council of 15 has drawn up a resolution "suggesting" that their pastor resign not later than June 30. Rev. Mills has not yet indicated what course he will pursue.

The pastor, commissioned as a major during the war, "mingled too freely" with down-and-outs, spoke at meetings of radicals, invited "floaters" and hoboes to join the church and "held open forums on employment conditions in the church parlors," his opponents charge.

Gary Woman Has New Way To Rebuke Her Husband
