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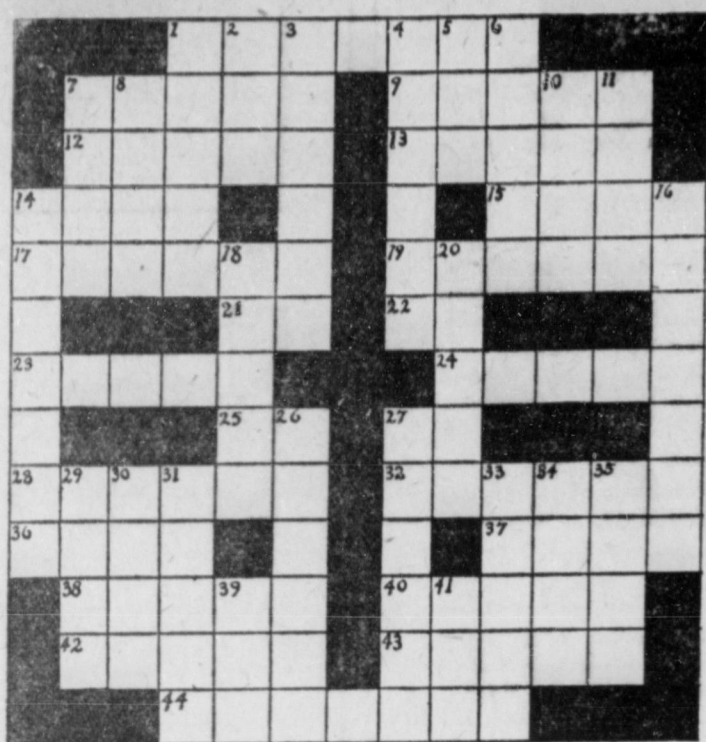
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CROSS-WORD PUZZLE No. 32

NOTICE OF TIME TO PAY DRAINAGE ASSESSMENTS

Notice is hereby given that the assessment sheet containing the several assessments against the lands in Adams county, Indiana, on account of the construction of the Henry E. Johns et al. Drain has been placed in the hands of the county treasurer of Adams county for collection. The board of county commissioners of Wells county, Indiana, has made and entered an order that said assessments shall be paid in ten annual installments, with interest at six percent per annum, the first of which shall be due and payable on the first Monday in May, 1925, and one installment on the first Monday in May each year thereafter until all are due, and said board has further fixed the 5th day of May, 1925, as the day on or before which the owner or owners of any tract or parcel of land, desiring to pay in full the assessment and discharge said liability of such assessment, shall have the right to do so. All persons affected by said assessments, desiring to pay such assessments in order to discharge their lands from all liability to such assessments, may do so by paying the full amount of said assessment to said county treasurer on or before said 5th day of May, 1925.

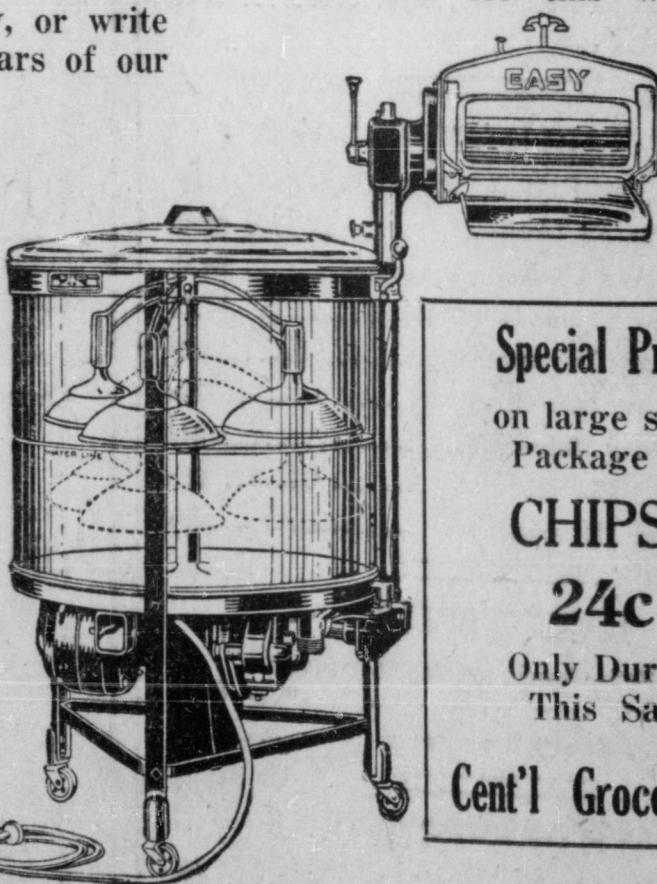

REAL ESTATE APPRAISAL:—

Assuming that the state tax board's order for the reassessment of real estate in Indiana is legal and will withstand any attack that may be made upon it, the result of the board's action will be far reaching. Under the law real property is appraised for taxation every four years. New property, that has not been appraised, may be added to the records and improvements may be listed during the taxing periods. But a sweeping order to revalue all of the real estate in Indiana is out of the ordinary.

Real estate was assessed in 1922, and had the order not been issued there would have been no reassessment until next year. All budgets, whether made by township, county or state officials, were figured on a basis of present valuations. The officials estimated the amount of taxes that would be collected and this also was true in connection with fixing tax rates for another year.

The reassessment will be made with a strong presumption in favor of lowering valuations. It is for that purpose that the order is made a year before the law contemplated such action. This may mean a shrinkage of millions in values. Either there will be less revenue or a material increase in tax rates. Some property, notably agricultural, is worth less than it was in 1922. Other properties are worth as much as they were when the assessment was made. Some classes of real estate property have even increased in value. It would be wrong in principle to begin cutting valuations everywhere because a new assessment has been ordered. Property rarely is, but under the law always should be assessed for what it is worth but getting that value this year, with so many clamoring for decreases, may be difficult.—Indianapolis News.

There is a movement on now to do away with county infirmaries and establish one or two more state infirmaries, the argument being that this can be done at a maintenance cost of about one-half what it now costs per person to take care of the unfortunate. It is perhaps true that this could be done if we don't figure on the cost of construction, but if we build two homes in the state now we will invest millions of dollars and each county will sacrifice on the properties held by them. It may be worth thinking about but we certainly ought to have more definite knowledge than we had on the state reformatory which cost three or four million and is not near finished.

Tomorrow is the day fixed by law for the opening of the session of the legislature and for sixty days the people of Indiana will be uneasy. Here's hoping they do a better job of it than they did two years ago, but since that record was approved by the recent election, the law makers and those boosting for big appropriations, feel they have the license to go ahead. It is probable they will talk a lot about economy and then about the last week appropriate enough money to make us all groan for a couple of years.

Every property owner between Decatur and the Allen county line has

promised to attend the meeting Friday evening when the proposed road improvement will be discussed and plans made for securing the right-of-ways, provided the proposals are satisfactory to all concerned as it is believed they will be. That's real co-operation.

The banquet, annual election and general meeting Monday night is an important meeting and should be a very delightful affair. A hundred business men will gather to discuss plans for the coming year. Its a splendid thing for the community, everybody in it and all who take part in the efforts to step ahead.
