Huge Bond Issue Is Offered By Utility

New York, Jan. 8.—A bond issue of \$125,000,000 offered today for the American Telephone and Telegraph company, the nation's only billion dollar public utility, in point of capitalization. It was the largest public issue of any kind since the \$150,000,000 Japanese government loan of a year ago.

The offering was priced at 95 to yield 5.30 per cent to investors. The interest charge is about one third less than the rate governments of Germany, France, Japan and Belgium were able to obtain on recent big loans, reflecting a rating which places the company in the group of accounts second only to the American government and some of the strongest American states.

The issue consists of 35 years sinking fund five per cent gold debenture bonds. It is offered by a syndicate headed by J. P. Morgan and company.
