Will File \$1,000,000 Suit Against Henry Ford

UNITED PRESS SERVICE Chicago, Jan. 8.—Suit for \$1,000,000 will be filed against Henry Ford within thirty days unless he retracts certain statements made in his weekly magazine, the Dearborn Independent, against Attorney Aaron Sapiro of Chicago, it was announced.

Sapiro has mailed Ford the document preliminary to filing suit. Under the laws of Michigan a formal demand of retraction must be made before suit is filed. Sapiro is attorney for several farmers' co-operative organizations.

"Mr. Ford, through his publication has made an attempt to destroy my participation in the co-operative

movement," Sapiro said. The articles in question linked his name with Bernard Baruch, Otto Kahn, Julius Rosenwald, Eugene Meyer, Jr., and Albert D. Lasker, all millionaires.




