FARMER HURT IN
PECULIAR MANNER

Bullet Lodged In Rifle Hits

His Hand When Heat

Causes Explosion

James A. Steele, well known Kirkland township farmer, was painfully injured in a peculiar accident about 9 o'clock this morning. Mr. Steele was attempting to melt a few bullets that had lodged in the barrel of his .22 calibre rifle, by heating the barrel on the coals in a base-burner, when suddenly the bullets were fired from the trigger end of the gun. One of the bullets struck Mr. Steele's left hand, burying itself in the flesh. Another bullet crashed into the wall of the room.

When a neighbor attempted to shoot a hog with the gun this morning, the shot failed to hit the hog and upon investigation, it was found that not only that bullet, but others were lodged in the barrel. Mr. Steele laid the barrel of the gun on the live coals in the base-burner in hopes of melting the lead bullets. After the barrel became hot Mr. Steele raised up the stock of the gun, which protruded from the stove, and the bullets came crashing out toward him. It is thought that the heat caused a vacuum in the barrel, causing an explosion which forced the bullets out with great force. The gun cracked as loud as when the bullets are fired from the cartridges. There was no powder in the gun. Mr. Steele came to this city and had an X-Ray taken of the hand to locate the bullet.
