FARMER HURT IN PECULIAR MANNER

Bullet Lodged In Rifle Hits His Hand When Heat Causes Explosion

James A. Steele, well known Kirk-
land township farmer, was painfully
injured in a peculiar accident about 9
o'clock this morning. Mr. Steele was
attempting to melt a few bullets that
had lodged in the barrel of his .22
calibre rifle, by heating the barrel on
the coals in a base-burner, when sud-
denly the bullets were fired from the
trigger end of the gun. One of the
bullets struck Mr. Steele's left hand,
burying itself in the flesh. Another
bullet crashed into the wall of the
room.

When a neighbor attempted to
shoot a hog with the gun this morn-
ing, the shot failed to hit the hog and
upon investigation, it was found that
not only that bullet, but others were
lodged in the barrel. Mr. Steele laid
the barrel of the gun on the live coals
in the base-burner in hopes of melt-
ing the lead bullets. After the barrel
became hot Mr. Steele raised up the
stock of the gun, which protruded
from the stove, and the bullets came
crashing out toward him. It is
thought that the heat caused a vacu-
um in the barrel, causing an ex-
plosion which forced the bullets out
with great force. The gun cracked
as loud as when the bullets are fired
from the cartridges. There was no
powder in the gun. Mr. Steele came
to this city and had an X-Ray taken
of the hand to locate the bullet.

American And British Delegates In Deadlock

Paris, Jan. 9.—(Special to Daily
Democrat) — American and British
delegates who have been negotiating
privately regarding Britain's objec-
tions to the United States' claim to a
share of payments under the Dawes
plan reached a deadlock today ac-
cording to British advices.

conferring with Winston Churchill,
British chancellor of the exchequer,
has wired to Washington for in-
structions.

Charges Against Traction Crew Dismissed Today

Anderson, Ind., Jan. 9.—Indictments
charging involuntary manslaughter
against Rollin Flynn and Charles
Sawyer, of Muncie, were dismissed
by Judge Kittinger in circuit court
today on grounds of insufficient evi-
dence.

The men were under indictment as
result of the collision of two in-
terurban cars on the Union Traction
lines near Fortville last February in
which seventeen persons were killed.
Flynn and Sawyer were in charge
of the east bound car which ran past
a switch and crashed into the west
bound car.

Charred Body Is Found In A Burned Haystack

Ottawa, O., Jan. 9.—A charred hu-
man torso was revealed after fire had
destroyed a haystack on the Mark
Bogart farm, near here today.
Prosecutor Julius S. Ogan said he
was convinced the haystack had been
burned for the purpose of destroying
the body.
Clarence Jones, deputy sheriff, and
a score of farmers are spading up the
earth near the stack in the hope of
finding other parts of the body.

Lillian Karges, who said she was
married secretly at midnight to Fred
