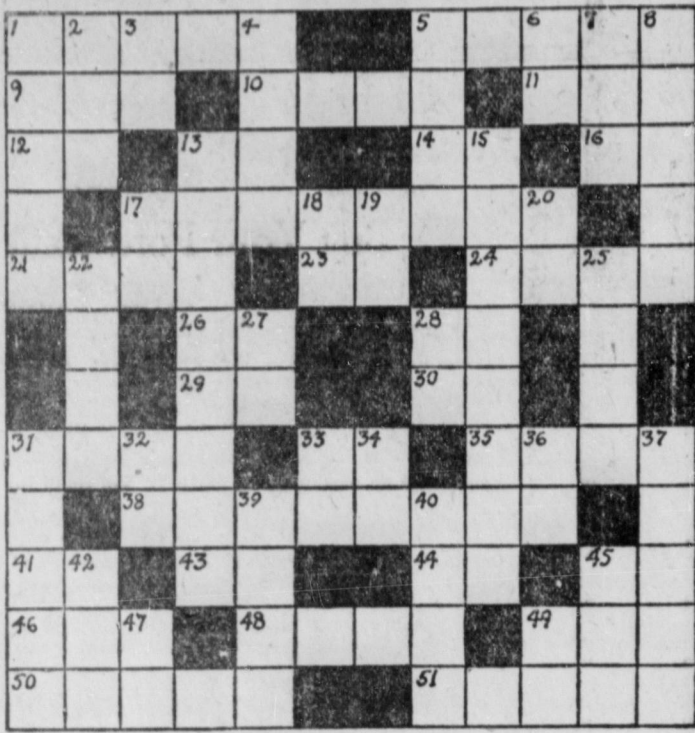

Dr. Mattax was a member of the Adams County Medicine society, a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge at Geneva, and of the Methodist church. In politics he was a democrat and took an active part in

promoting the general welfare of the community and in being of whatever service he could. He was always ready to give of his service and in practicing his profession was a true and faithful servant.

Elected Coroner in 1920

Dr. Mattax began serving his third term as coroner of Adams county on January 1, 1925. He was first elected

ed to office in November, 1920, and assumed office in 1921, being elected for the second term two years later.

Funeral Sunday Afternoon

Funeral services for Dr. Mattax will be held Sunday afternoon at two thirty from the Methodist church at Geneva, Rev. D. V. Williams officiating. Burial will be made in the Riverside Cemetery at Geneva.
