## BERNARD GRANT GETS REPRIEVE

### "Back Of The Yards" Youth Again Dodges Shadow Of Gallows

(UNITED PRESS SERVICE) Chicago, Jan. 9.—Once more Bernard Grant, "back of the yards" youth, breathes easy, as he again dodges the shadow of the gallows.

Governor Small late yesterday gave him another ninety day reprieve from hanging in connection with the murder of Patrolman Ralph Souders.

Grant was out to hang of Jan. 16, but Small decided to give him another reprieve pending action of the supreme court on the appeal of Walter Krauser also sentenced to death for the Souders murder.

Hair almost white from worry and suspense, Grant was practically beside himself with joy today.

"That means another chance to fight for life," he said when word of the reprieve was brought to him.

The fight for Grant's life is based on the Leopold-Loeb case, where jail sentence were imposed for a confessed murder by two wealthy youths.

Equal justice for rich and poor," has been the cry of the youth's attorneys and approximately 1,000,000 letters and telegrams demanding commutation of sentence have swept in on the governor from all parts of the country.

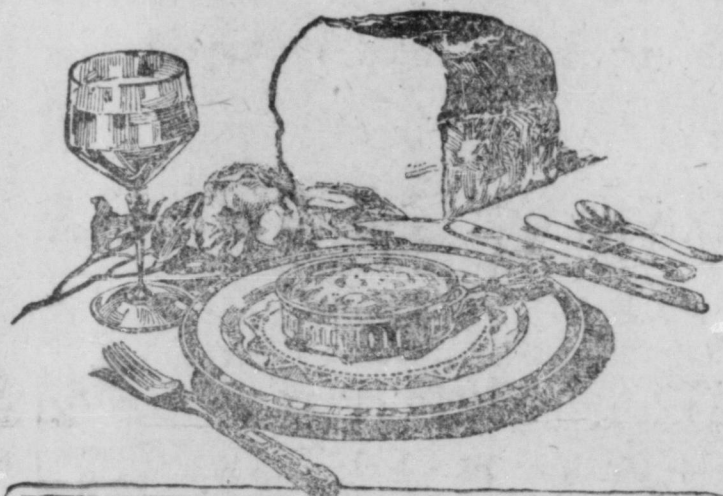
