Jackson declared. "The institutions are in good condition and under splendid management," Governor Jackson told the legislators. "They must be kept absolutely free from politics in the future. There may be many who think that the management may be done and yet could get along without it. The same is true of our respective families, and we should require the same economy in their management that the ordinary household is compelled to practice."

"There should be no excuse for the borrowing of money to pay the operating expenses of our state government. We now have borrowed from outside sources two million five hundred thousand dollars. There has also been money borrowed from various funds to meet obligations falling due against the general fund."

Amendment to the state tax laws requiring a revaluation of real estate this year and a revaluation every four years thereafter was advocated by the governor.

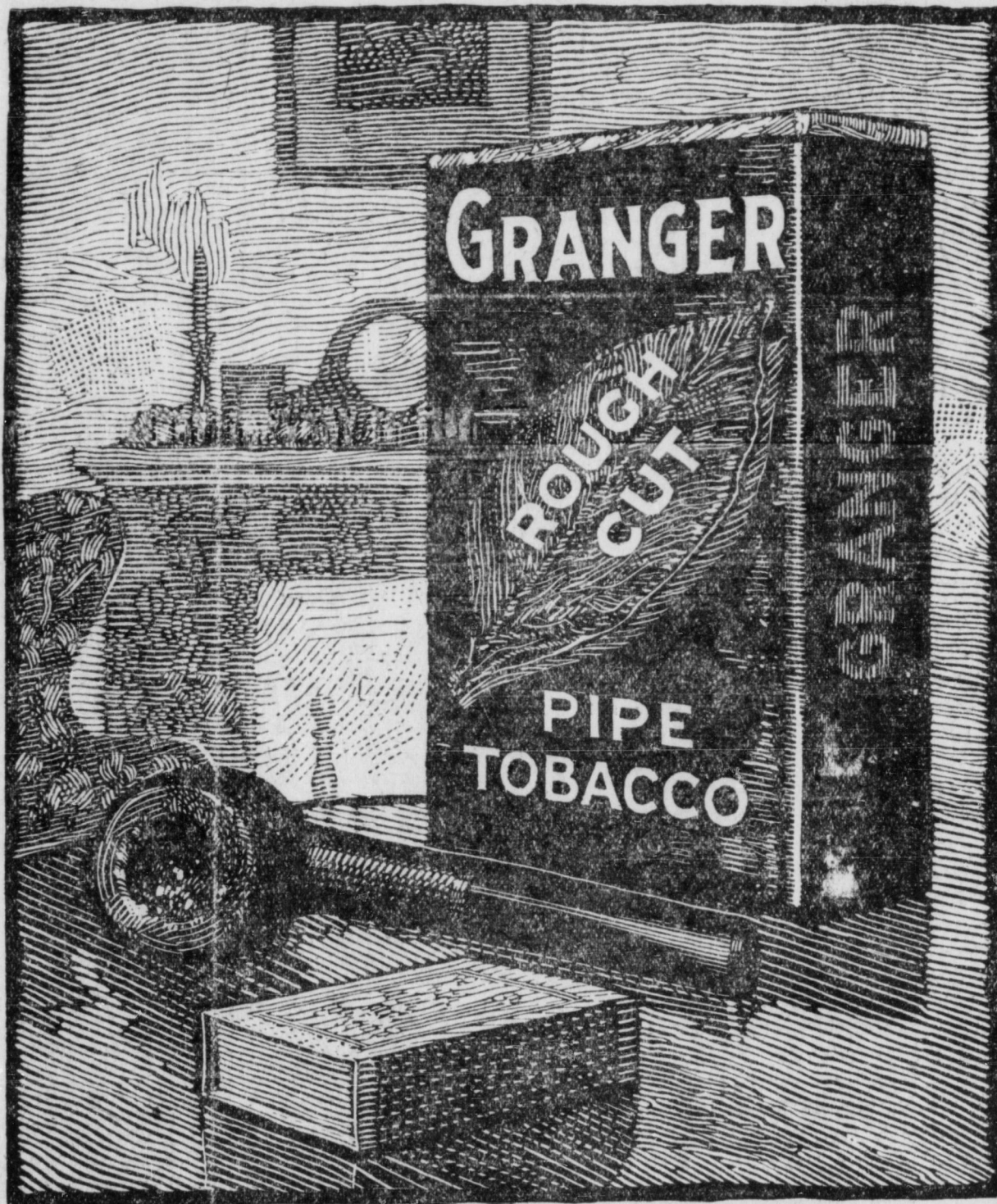
