

We have about concluded he is a slippery politician, pure and simple.

It is needless to say that we appreciate the splendid co-operation of the farmers and landowners along the route between this city and the Allen county line. Practically every one of them has shown interest and the record made by the committee yesterday has perhaps never been equalled in Indiana. Almost the entire eight miles has been signed up on the easements and it will very probably be up to the state highway commission to make good on their promises to give us the road during this year. It is hoped that by tomorrow a complete report can be made.

Most important of the matters taken up at the Industrial meeting last night was the approval voted to support County Agent Busche in his work to organize several junior clubs over the county. They will financially support the corn club, calf club, sugar beet club and will lend their aid in every way possible to make these associations of greatest good. This is an agricultural county and any improvement of conditions, any thing which adds to the interest in that work, any thing which helps to make the boys and girls take a part in the work of producing crops and raising stock and stick to the farm and enjoy it and profit by it, is the thing that ought to be done by this live city and county.

A campaign to raise a fund with which to purchase radio sets for five blind people in Decatur has been started by Charles Colter and Raymond Hartung and at the Industrial meeting last night, a total of \$77.25 was appropriated.
