Prominent Chicago Men Join Fight Against Crime

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Approximately one hundred of the city's wealthiest and most prominent business and professional men have enlisted in the fight on crime in Chicago.

Clifford Barnes, who attended the law enforcement breakfast at the White House some time ago stated that the committee of thousand, of which Judge Elbert Gary, of the United States Steel corporation, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and other noted men are members, would assist Mayor William Dever and Chief of Police Morgan A. Collins in their fight on crime.

At an executive session of the local branch of the committee of one thousand last night, ways and means of curbing the crime wave which has been sweeping Chicago for several months were discussed.

The Chicago crime commission charges that "crime is rampant because the morale of the police department is at a low ebb." Mayor Dever and Chief Collins hold that the charges were inspired by personal and political enemies.

Wisconsin Man Released By Mexican Authorities
