## LEGISLATURE RE-CONVENES

Expected To Get Down To Actual Debate On Measures This Week

(UNITED PRESS SERVICE) Indianapolis, Jan. 19.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—The state legislature is expected to get down to actual debate this week on several measures which have already been reported out of committee or on which a committee report will be forthcoming during the week.

Both houses were to reconvene this afternoon at 2 o'clock after the week-end recess since last Friday.

Senator English's bill providing heavier penalties for drunken drivers of automobiles was ready to furnish the battle ground in the upper house for the first tilt between bone dry prohibition forces and the liberal

The cooperative marketing bill sponsored by the Indiana Farm Bureau Federation may emerge during the week from the agricultural committees of both houses amended to overcome objections of elevator interests who say the original draft of the bill would kill cooperative elevators already in existence.

In the house the fight over the prohibition question will be launched when the morals committee reports on Representative Wright's bone dry bill to put teeth in the state prohibition laws. The committee is planning to report on the bill this week.

Numerous other committees in both houses were giving early attention to bills referred to them and more committee reports than were ever made at a second week session of the legislature are looked for.

Great Lakes Region To See Big Building Boom

Chicago, Jan. 19.—The Great Lakes region in 1925 will see the greatest building boom since the war, Barney Cohen, district director of U. S. employment service, predicted today on the basis of a building prospectus of the midwest states.

Illinois heads the list of states with a gigantic state wide construction program.

Michigan falls in line with a contemplated increase of one-third of its building projects over last year, Cohen said.
