Nurmi Decides To Stay In America Until March

(UNITED PRESS SERVICE) New York, Jan. 19.—Relieved of a heavy peeve that he took on in Chicago, Paavo Nurmi, Finland's running champion, has decided not to return home at once, and will remain in this country until late in March.

There are 15 more races on the program arranged by his managers and he is now in a mood to go through with his part although he may not make any long tracks and may confine his competition to ten lap tracks.

Nurmi was almost in a rage when he returned here Saturday night from Chicago to run in his third race in 48 hours after having made a 2,000-mile railroad journey.

If Nurmi had been beaten by Jole Ray in Chicago Friday, instead of turning in the new world's record he made, he would have demanded a ticket to Finland on the first ship out, it was learned.

The Finn claimed that he had been assured that he would run on a ten lap track and when he went out for the race he learned that the size of the track has been reduced to 12 laps and all his plans for pace in the race had to be changed. He blamed the officials for using him only as the means of getting more money into the house at the expense of a reputation he might have lost on a smaller track.

MANY FANS WILL ACCOMPANY TEAM

Large Number To See Catholic High Play C. C. H. S. Saturday Night

A large crowd of fans are expected to accompany the Decatur Catholic high school basketball team to Fort Wayne Saturday night to see the green clad warriors battle the Central Catholic high school quintet in the second game of the three-game series between the two teams. The game will be played in Library Hall.

All fans who are planning to go on the interurban are requested to notify Father Otto Peters, Phone 121 as early possible this week, in order that arrangements can be made with the interurban company for providing enough cars to carry the fans. It will not be necessary to charter a special car to secure reduced rates, as the local fans can obtain the regular reduced rate for night travel by going on the seven o'clock car. The interurban company has a special rate of 66 cents per round trip for every evening after seven o'clock. If the number of fans going to the game is too large for one car, it will be necessary for the interurban company to know it ahead of time in order that a trailer may be secured.

Interest in the game is great here and at Fort Wayne. The locals hold one victory over the Fort Wayne team so far this season and will fight to make it two straight Saturday night. Much depends on the outcome of this game as to which team will represent this section of the state in the National Catholic tournament at Chicago next spring.

YELLOW JACKETS LOSE AT AUBURN

Lead Until Final Minute But Lose, 26-25; D. H. S. Girls Lose

Decatur high school's Yellow Jackets suffered their third straight defeat Saturday night at Auburn, but not until after a thrilling and exceptionally fast contest with the Auburn cagers, the final score being 26-25. The winning basket was made by Auburn in the last minutes and a half of play, after the Yellow Jackets had led nearly all the way. Auburn girls made it a perfect evening for Auburn fans by defeating the Decatur girls in the preliminary, 26-14.

The boys' game was said to be the most thrilling game ever played in Auburn. During the last few minutes of the game the fans were literally going wild with excitement and the players speeded up until team-

work was forgotten and every player tried desperately to sink a field goal that would win the game. Auburn won the game on free throws, the Yellow Jackets outscoring the winners 13-16 on field goals.

Auburn scored first on a field goal, but the Yellow Jackets soon tied the count and took the lead which they held until the final basket was made by Auburn. Coach Kennedy's Yellow Jackets led at the end of the first half, 20-12, they having outclassed the Auburn cagers during the period, and appeared to be headed to a victory. The fighting Yellow Jackets held on to their lead during the first part of the second half and with nine minutes left to play were leading by eight points. Then the Auburn cagers began to cut down the lead. Only one and one-half minutes remained to be played and Decatur still held the lead, but by the scant margin of one point. Then Auburn caged a field goal and won the game. Mark Bills refereed the game and did a fine job of officiating.

Huge Quantity Of Bootleg Alcohol Denatured Today

Valued at all the way from \$100,000 to \$500,000, bootleg prices, the 11,550 gallons of alcohol was reduced to a value of \$6,000 by the denaturing process. 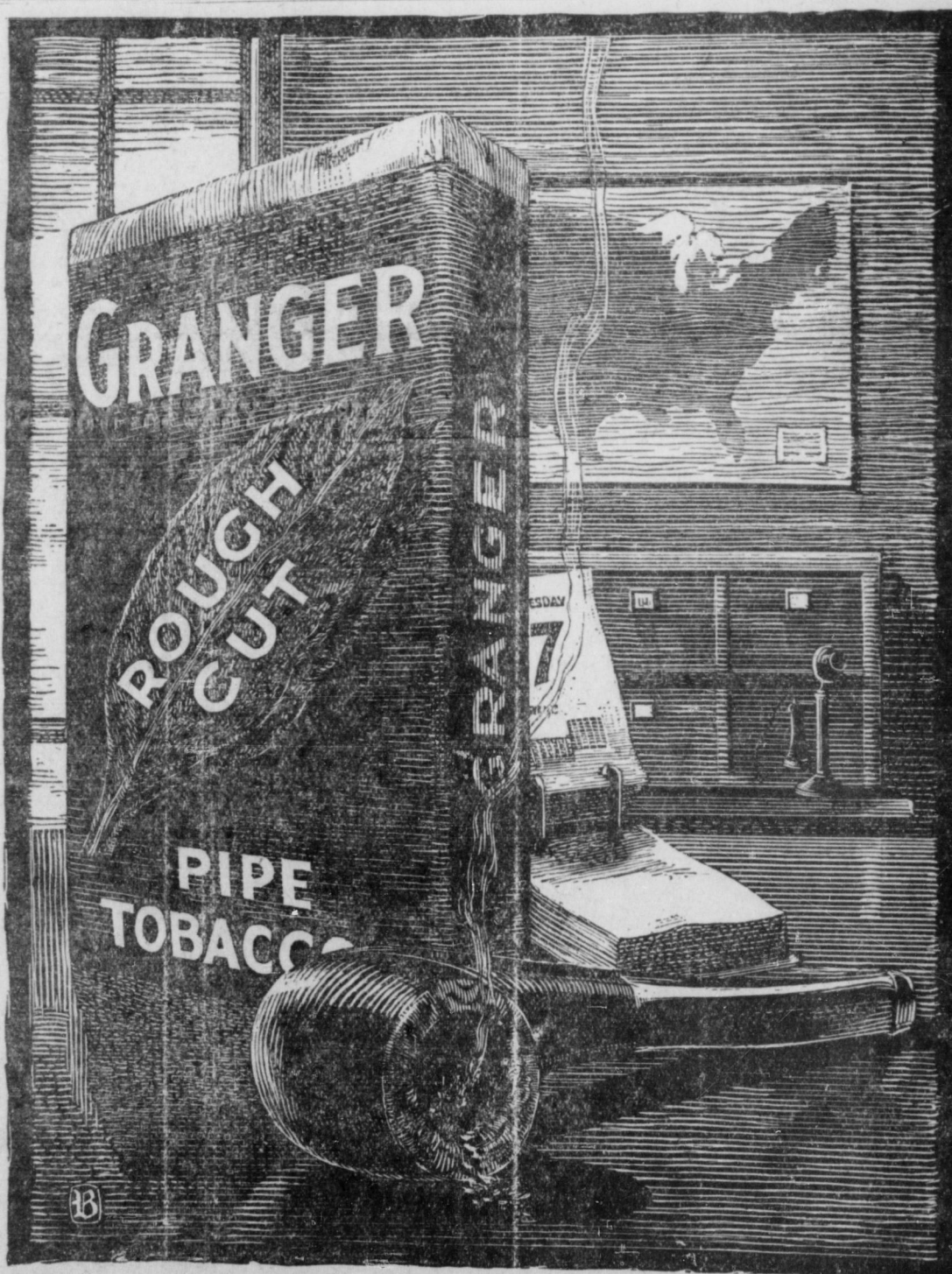
