Chicago, Jan. 21.—Bread grains jumped fractionally at opening of business on the board of trade today. Coarse grains had an easier undertone.

Wheat was influenced by foreign developments. Broomhills' resume of the world situation brought a short wave of buying.

Liquidation pressed corn down a fraction. There was plenty of long corn to be had with houses against the recent advances leading sellers. Oats followed corn on a featureless market.

Provisions strength reflected higher hog and cattle and increased shipments.
