

PROPOSE REPORT ON STATE SURVEY

Opposition To Recommendation Develops In Legislature

Indianapolis, Jan. 21.—Opposition to the recommendations of Governor Harrison's survey committee developed among members of the legislature today.

The report of the committee, which was appointed by Jackson last fall to study the state institutions and departments, recommended sweeping changes in the structure of the government.

Senator James J. Nejd, of Whitefish, a republican floor leader in the senate, described the report as revolutionary and radical.

The move to create a board of public safety through commission of police power is nothing more than a state constabulary in disguise, he said.

Nejd also took issue with the proposal to reduce the membership of the state industrial board from five to three members.

The board was increased to five members because of the large volume of business it must handle, and is still unable to keep up with its work, Nejd said.

Nejd also recommended that the office of the state superintendent of public instruction be made an appointive office instead of elective.

That change must never be made if the state schools are to be kept free of political domination, Nejd said.

"An organization might control a man, but it can't control the votes of all the people," he said.

Several members of the legislature expressed opposition to the move to abolish the state printing board and give its work to the purchasing department. Other recommendations were questioned in discussions of senators and representatives.

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HARD TO PICK TOURNEY WINNER

Favorites In County Basketball Tourney May Have Tough Going

Another good bet is the Monroe team which has taken a new lease on the game since her last triumphs. And with the wealth of material she possesses, should give a mighty good account of herself in the tourney.

From down in the south west corner of the county comes the team that little has been said about this year, Hartford, but there is no doubt but that it is one of the best teams in the county and when the county tourney is over, there are others who likely will have the same opinion as the writer, that it is a very good team. Jefferson and Pleasant Mills may spring a surprise.

In the eighth grade contest, from the preliminary viewpoint, it looks like an easy victory for Decatur. But voices from French township, where they grow them tall, say that they are bringing a regular "Haggerty" outfit here.

Then from out of Kirkland township, home of the Midgets, comes a rather weak voice, so far, but a promise of more strength Friday night, when they meet Decatur in the first round of the contest. Then Martz, captain of the Monroe quintet, has boasted that his team is the sure winner. So if any stock can be placed in these rumors it looks as though the eighth graders would furnish real excitement.

In the girls' contest the Pleasant Mills girls are expected to beat Kirkland, and probably Berne won't have much difficulty in conquering Monroe, thus leaving Pleasant Mills and Berne to play the finals with the Berne girls a decided favorite.

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Astronomy, the science which is the chief interpreter of natural phenomena of the heavenly bodies, will give the world another exhibition of her skill and mission on Jan. 24th, at a little before 9 a. m. She informs us that the sun on rising in Northern Minnesota will have his disc covered by that of the moon passing directly between the earth and the sun.

The great shadow will sweep, in a path 100 miles wide east and south across the great lakes, Northern Pennsylvania, New York, Connecticut and Rhode Island. Partial eclipse will be seen as Greenland, and south to the mouth of the Amazon river. The shadow will sweep like a giant thunder cloud at the speed of a thousand miles per hour. Quivering rippling bands will appear on every white surface until the darkness rushes in blotting out the sun.

Persons on the line of the shadow will see the moon and stars shining

brilliantly while the sun is shining but fifty miles north and south of the line of the shadow. It is by far the most brilliant phenomenon of the astronomical world and the sight of a lifetime.

As the sun is blotted out you will see a black disk radiating rays of light. Just outside the disk is a shadow rim of brilliant red, the chromosphere; and outside that is the wonderful pearly white corona. The corona is little understood. Its light is so delicate that under all circumstances, except total eclipse, it is invisible. It is hoped, and efforts are being made, to study and more fully know it at this time. Everybody will have to look hard, work fast and waste no time for the duration of eclipse is less than five minutes.

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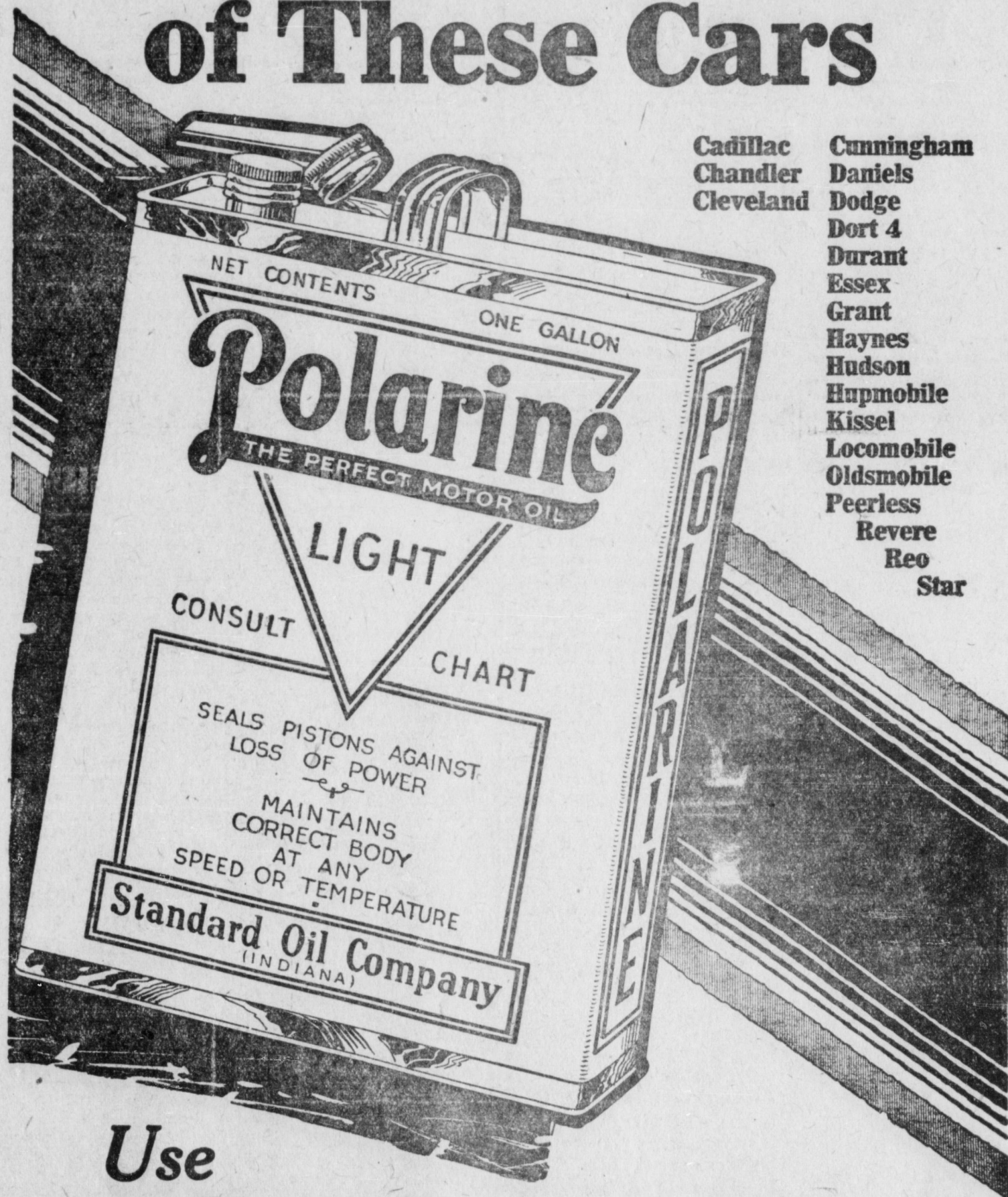
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
