

elements on the sun.
"At the moment of eclipse, the central body of the sun is completely obscured, and the only light given off comes from the corona, which is the halo of incandescent gases which spring out from the central body. Past observations have given ground for suspicion that a hitherto unknown element tentatively named "coronium," exists in the corona mixture of intensely hot gaseous elements.

"As a matter of incidental interest Dr. Kiess points out that helium, the gas which will sustain the Los Angeles during the observations, was first discovered by spectroscopic observation of the sun, and later identified and put to use from among the earth's own stock of elements."
