## CATHOLIC HIGH BEATS OLD RIVAL

### Wins Great Victory Over C.C.H.S. Of Ft. Wayne, Score 29-14

Decatur Catholic high school's green clad basketball warriors won a glorious victory Saturday night when they invaded Fort Wayne and, for the second time this season, defeated the Central Catholic high school by the decisive score of 29 to 14. The margin of victory was far greater than even the most ardent Decatur fans had expected. This victory which was the eleventh straight, places the local cagers at the head of the East of Catholic high school teams in the state, they having defeated C. C. H. S., St. Marys of Huntington and Cathedral of Indianapolis, while Cathedral has defeated Ghault of Vincennes. The locals have not been defeated this season.

A large crowd of Decatur fans accompanied the wearers of the green to Fort Wayne and they made their presence known throughout the game. The Decatur Catholics played one of the best games of their career Saturday night and completely outclassed the Fort Wayne team.

Decatur took the lead shortly after the start of the battle when Captain Voglewede broke through the C. C. H. S. defense and caged a field goal. Coach Conter's men then ran their score up to 11 points before Captain McCarty registered the first point for his team on a free throw. The Fort Wayne cagers then braced and held the Decatur team scoreless for the remainder of the half while they increased their total to 7, the half ending 11 to 7.

The second half was fast and the home team fought hard to stave off defeat but the Decatur players were determined to keep their string of victories unbroken. "Mongo" Meyers, became eligible for competition last week, broke loose on a scoring spree in the second half and the speedy little forward hit the draperies five times from the field and three times from the foul line in the second half. He scored two field goals in the first half, making his total points for the game 17. The Fort Wayne players found it extremely difficult to break through the Decatur defense and their long shots went wild.

Meyers was the high point man of the game, with Captain Voglewede of Decatur, next in line with a total of seven points. Gass, Decatur, back guard, left the game late in the second half when the fourth personal foul was called on him. Art Voglewede took his place and guarded the goal in nice fashion. The locals will go to Indianapolis next Friday night to play a return game with Cathedral high school of that city. Cathedral was defeated here two weeks ago by the score of 27 to 18.

The Berne team played one of the best if not the best game it has played this season. The winners out-paced, out-guarded and out-shot the Kirkland team, which put up a scrappy fight. The Kirkland cagers, who are known for their never-give-up fight, fought until the final whistle Saturday night, but they were unable to cope with the excellent basket-shooting of the Berne players.

#### Berne Leads At Half

The score was tied at 2 all soon after the start. Berne broke up the tie with a field goal for Berne. Berne took out after six minutes of play. The half ended 10-6 in favor of Berne. Ernst and F. Arnold had carried the brunt of the Kirkland attack during the opening period, while Bagley and D. Ellensberger had led the Berne offense. Kirkland came back strong at the start of the second half and K. Arnold sank a field goal. Berne scored another field goal, however, maintaining the lead. Bagley then dropped in a field goal from the center of the court, and a teammate counted a field goal. Score, 16 to 8. Berne scored another field goal and then Ernst, veteran Kirkland center, dropped in a two-pointer from long range. Bagley scored from under the basket for Berne.

Coach Null, of Kirkland, sent in substitutes in hopes that the fresh players would be able to turn the tide. The fast pace and the tourney grind was beginning to show on the Berne players. With seven minutes left to play Berne was leading, 20-11. Kirkland's hopes were revived when Ernst sank a field goal, but Bagley, who was high point man of the game, evened matters up by counting again from the field. L. Arnold was hurt in a mixup and Kirkland took time out. Four minutes left to play, Berne scored two points for Berne. Berne took time out and Smith substituted for Ernst, who injured an ankle. Smith celebrated his entry in the game by sinking a free goal from the side of the floor. This ended the scoring and the game ended with the ball in the center of the floor.
