CATHOLIC HIGH TO INDIANAPOLIS

Meets Cathedral Tonight; K. of C. Night at Monday's Contest

The Catholic high school basketball team left at noon today for Indianapolis where the green clad warriors will meet Cathedral high school in a return game tonight. With a record of eleven victories and no defeats to their credit, the locals were confident of beating the capital city lads again and keeping their record unbroken. The trip was made in a motor bus. The team will spend the night in Indianapolis and start home Saturday morning.

On next Monday night, the Catholic high cagers will play the Gibault Catholic high school team of Vincennes in the high school gymnasium here. That night has been designated as Knights of Columbus night and the members of the local order will attend the game in a body. The lodge meeting will start at 7:30 o'clock and will be over in time for the game. A section of seats in the southwest corner of the gym will be reserved for the Knights. The preliminary game will not start until 8 o'clock, as the Central school play cast will be using the auditorium, directly above the gymnasium, until that hour. The big game will start about 9 o'clock. Oliver will referee. The Vincennes team is one of the strongest Catholic high school quintets in the southern part of the state and a victory over that outfit would give the locals a fairly clear claim to the Catholic championship of the state, providing they defeat Cathedral again tonight.

G. E. QUINTET PLAYS MUNCIE

Fast Basketball Game Is Promised For Local Fans Tonight

A high class game of basketball is scheduled for tonight when the General Electric cagers meet the fast Muncie Merchants at the high school gym here. The Muncie team has a long string of victories to its credit, and Manager Blackburn, of the G. E. five, has taken extra precautions by strengthening his lineup to hand the visitors a defeat.

Gale, the Lancaster school teacher who has been going big with the G. E. quintet and Leaders recently, will play center tonight. Claude Clark will play forward. Two new men have been secured to work at forward, also. Armstrong, a former Anderson high school star who has been playing on the Portland Independent team this winter, and Wil-

liams, another former Anderson high school star, are the two newcomers for tonight's game. Bill Crist, the veteran backguard on the Decatur Leaders quintet, will ward off the under-the-basket attacks tonight for the G. E., while Jack Teeple and Cliff Clark, will probably alternate at floor guard. Oliver, who is unable to play on account of a fractured rib, will referee the game tonight.

The G. E. girls' team has been strengthened for the game with the Auburn Y. W. C. A. team tonight, also. The girls' game will start at 7:30 o'clock and the big game will get under way about 8:30 o'clock.

YELLOW JACKETS PLAY AT BERNE

Locals Have Changed Line-up For Game With County Champs

Coach Kennedy and his Yellow Jackets will go to Berne tonight to play a return game with the winners of the Adams county tourney. The Berne quintet has been going good lately and a hard game is expected by Coach Kennedy and his players.

The Yellow Jackets likely will enter the game tonight with a changed lineup. It will be necessary to keep Moser and Strickler out of the game in order for them to be eligible to play in the district tournament, as each player is permitted to play in only twenty games during the season and those who are approaching their limit. It is possible that Andrews, regular center, may not play tonight for the same reason. Captain Miller, who was out of the game for three weeks on account of ineligibility, will play tonight. Deal has quit the squad and will not play tonight. The probable lineup for tonight's game is: Swearingin and Leonard, forwards; Bebout or Andrews, center; Miller and Dierkes, guards. Reynolds has been moved from floor guard to forward this week and is working well in his new position. He likely will get a chance to work at forward part of the time tonight.

The Decatur girls will play the Berne girls in a preliminary game. The game will not start until after the revival service in Berne is over. The first game likely will start about 9 o'clock. Several Decatur fans are planning to accompany the local teams.

The Yellow Jackets will play Van Wert at the high school gym here Saturday night.

Franklin-Butler Game To Attract Big Crowd

Indianapolis, Jan. 30.—The Butler-Franklin basketball game may break the world's record for attendance at a college basketball game according to figures made known at the college today. Ohio State has played to a single crowd of over 12,000 people on several occasions and as far as can be ascertained, holds the attendance record. Playing in the new Exposition building at the state fairgrounds, which will easily accommodate 12,000 spectators, the Baptist-Bulldog fight appears likely to smash the Buckeye record. The fact that the Bulldogs administered the only defeat ever suffered by Franklin under the coaching of Griz Wagner, has added unusual interest to the game. Mail orders are com-

ing in from all parts of the state and the Butler management has arranged with transportation companies to handle the increased traffic. Very few of the fans from out in the state have had any chance to see the Franklin "Wonder Team" in action since the finals of the tournament several years ago and it is expected that a great number will come in for the game.

Interest in Indianapolis is unusually high and this game will offer the first opportunity for the general public to see the Bulldogs in action as the previous games have been played in Tomlinson Hall and the sale of tickets has been limited to a few hundred. Several high school coaches have already purchased tickets for their squads and it is expected that a large number of high school teams will witness the battle. The capacity of the hall will be increased if the advance sale of tickets indicates that there will be an overflow crowd. In order to prevent any congestion at the gates of the Exposition Building, persons who are planning to attend the game should purchase tickets in advance. Tickets may be purchased at the Indianapolis store of A. G. Spalding and Bros., or may be ordered by mail from Butler College. Admission will be one dollar. Mail orders must be accompanied by money order or certified check for proper amount, plus 10 cents for sending tickets by registered mail. Money orders should be made payable to H. O. Page, Athletic Director.

Interest Centers In Indiana-Iowa Clash

Interest is centered on the Indiana-Iowa clash. Iowa lost its first game of the season to Illinois last Saturday while Indiana won its first Big Ten contest the same night. The Hoosiers, with the aid of Beckner and Winston, who became eligible at the end of the first semester, seemed to hit their stride in the Maroon contest and will fight to continue their winning streak. As no university classes are being held this week during the vacation between semesters, Coach Dean's pupils are able to center their entire attention on the hardwood sport.

Sleeps Until Time To Go To Electric Chair

old Anna Tomicich, slept last night until prison attaches awakened him to conduct him to the electric chair. Bergolini went to bed at 3 o'clock and the prison workers had to shake him hard to arouse him at 11:45. At 12:02 this morning the current was turned on and four minutes later he was pronounced dead. Prison officials say he was the calmest man they have ever seen executed. The electrocution of Bergolini set a speed record for justice here. He brutally attacked the child and then killed her on September 22 last year. On Oct. 15 he had been convicted

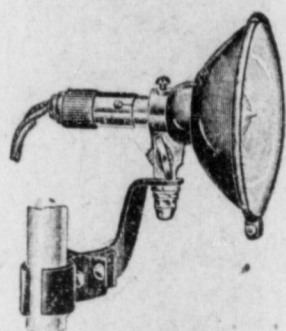
