Chicago, April 3.—Grains today dropped to the lowest level since last August as result of heavy selling on the Chicago board of trade.

May wheat closed at \$1.33 1/2 compared with previous close of \$1.43. Corn registered the biggest losses. May corn fell 5 3/8 cents.

Indianapolis, April 3.—Checks for a total of \$182,000 were in the mails today for dependents of forty-eight miners killed in the City coal mine explosion at Sullivan last February. The awards were made under the workmen's compensation act after an investigation of claims by the state industrial board.

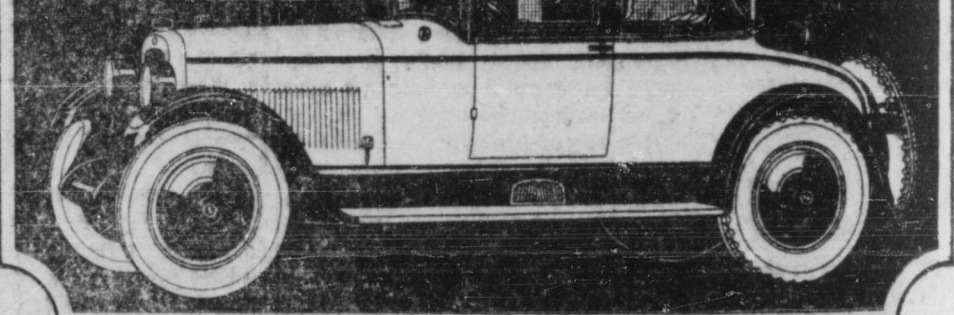
