Chicago, April 3.—Grains today dropped to the lowest level since last August as result of heavy selling on the Chicago board of trade.

May wheat closed at \$1.33 1/2 compared with previous close of \$1.43. Corn registered the biggest losses. May corn fell 6 3/8 cents.

Indianapolis, April 3.—Checks for a total of \$182,000 were in the mails today for dependents of forty-eight miners killed in the City coal mine explosion at Sullivan last February.
