WIDE SEARCH IS BEING MADE FOR MURDERER

advanced, but no definite evidence has been procured. The "moran" theory has received considerable support from reports of several persons living near the scene of the murder that they have often noticed a man riding east near there on a bicycle and that he always seemed to be in a hurry.

These reports have led authorities to believe that the crime was the work of a "moran" that lives near there. Efforts are still being made to trace the revolver that was found in the death car, but as yet no light has been shed on the clue. All possibilities of a murder-suicide have been given up and the authorities are concentrating their efforts on the murder, robbery and moron theories.

Funeral services were held for Mr. Fisher yesterday at his home and a great number of his friends attended the simple services. Miss Herbers' funeral was held this morning.

Hundreds of tourists and curiosity seekers have motored to the scene of the double tragedy. It is reported that a constant stream of automobiles drove past the scene yesterday and it was necessary to have traffic policemen at the road intersections near there.

Officials are continuing their investigation and with the assistance of other interested parties they still believe that they will be able to catch the person that performed the deed. Further information pertaining to the alleged moron that rides a bicycle near the Hessen Castle road is pouring into the police station at Fort Wayne, while other officials are keeping a close watch for him.

months is 909. During this period 583 operations were performed at the hospital, divided as follows: major operations, 278; minor operations 81; tonsillectomies 224. Other cases treated at the hospital were, medical cases, 156; maternities 63; fractures 36; burns 4; eye cases 3.

During rush periods every room on the first and second floors have been occupied and accommodations have been made on several occasions for patients in the sun rooms and on the third floor of the hospital.

The first day the hospital was opened to the public six persons were admitted as patients.
