PRESBYTERIANS ELECT ERDMAN

New Moderator Pledged To Restore Unity By "Peace- ful Methods"

Columbus, O., May 22.—Dr. Charles R. Erdman, Princeton, N. J., was elected moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. here late yesterday, pledged to restore harmony in the church by "peaceful methods."

On what his supporters declared was a direct issue raised by the modernist-fundamentalist controversy, Dr. Erdman defeated Dr. Lapsley A. McAfee, of Berkeley, Cal., who had been backed by the militant fundamentalists. The vote was Erdman 470, McAfee 424.

Dr. Harry C. Rogers, of Kansas City, also an Erdman conservative, received 16 votes. There were only three candidates, the name of Dr. W. O. Thompson, president of Ohio State University, Columbus, who William Jennings Bryan had announced he would support, being withdrawn.

THOUSANDS TEST CANADIAN BEER

75,000 Persons Reported To Have Tested Beverage Yesterday

Windsor, Ont., May 22.—(United Press) — Approximately 75,000 persons, two thirds of them Americans, already have paid between \$150,000 and \$200,000 here to test the "kick" of the 4.4 per cent beer that went on sale yesterday.

These figures are based on reports from hotel and restaurant proprietors who sold nearly half a million bottles of new beer to thirsty pilgrims who came from far and near by train, airplane, automobile, bicycle and afoot to taste it.

Despite the immense crowd that was entertained, not one arrest was made.

That the new beer is not of intoxicating strength was indicated by the fact that a \$100 prize offered by a brewer to the first person to get drunk on 4.4 per cent went unclaimed.

Visitors who attempted to take home a bottle or two of the new beverage as a souvenir or an eye-opener, were disappointed. When the crowd took the ferry back to Detroit customs men made certain that no beer went except that which was on the inside.

The beer rush crowd was a motley one, composed of bankers, farmers, laborers, clerks and women and children.

As soon as the afternoon visitors had departed, the evening crowd arrived to fill their places. A band, parading the crowded streets, was the life of the party until the musicians were "kidnaped" and taken to the exclusive Windsor club where they played for tired businessmen.

Taking the crowd unawares, the closing hour sent the thousands of visitors scurrying for the ferries. Only 2,000 could be carried at a trip and it was hours before some got across the river.

The station is open all day until about nine o'clock at night. All kinds of oils and other tourists' necessities, together with gasoline, are sold at the station. Clyde Fugate, owner of the station, said that the new concern will not interfere with the repair shop that he has conducted for several years in the west part of the city. It will continue under the same management.

TRIAL OF UNION MINERS IS OPENED

Bitter Demonstrations Occur As Trial Opens In Fairmont, W. Va.

Fairmont, W. Va., May 22.—A series of bitter demonstrations whipped up fury in the coal fields today as 134 union workers went on trial here charged with attempting to interfere with operation of non-union mines.

Upon the decision of the court virtually rests the outcome of the war to which both sides now see an end only in extinction of the United States Mine Workers of America organizations or the Northern West Virginia Operators.

The men are charged specifically with contempt of court for violating a stringent injunction issued by circuit court judge W. S. Meredith, restraining them from being in the presence of non-union workers on the ground their presence is intimidation. All will be tried in a group by the same judge who issued the injunction. They were rounded up in one of the numerous raids since trouble began several weeks ago—raids which have resulted
