Dawes Raps Opponents Of His Senate Rules Plan

Birmingham, Ala., May 28—Opposition to a change in the rules of the United States senate comes only from those whose individual power is threatened, according to Vice president Charles G. Dawes.

The vice president set forth his view once more last night when he spoke here from the same platform as Senator Oscar W. Underwood, democratic leader.

"These rules," Dawes said, "in their present form encourage parliamentary misbehavior of individual senators and invite selfishness, mediocrity, vanity and personal purpose to cloak themselves in the robe of arrogance."

He said the present rules of the senate "operate at times to destroy majority rights given by the constitution."

Chicago, May 28—Grain futures opened with a heavy undertone on the Chicago board of trade.

Selling pressure in wheat came from cash holders based on Liverpool's failure to follow out movements. A few improved crop advices brought about scattered liquidating in long grain. Cables reported our grain neglected because of free offerings of other varieties at discounts.

Indifferent demand for offers created a heavy corn market. Better crops brought some longs out on the selling side. Commission houses did a fair business on the buying side thus checking a downturn.

Oats moved with corn. Provisions advanced with hogs and cables.
