State Will Investigate  
Traction Wreck At Kokomo

Indianapolis, Ind., June 4.—A public service hearing to determine cause of the interurban wreck near Kokomo yesterday, in which nine persons were seriously hurt, will be held at Kokomo next week, David Matthews, chief railroad inspector for the commission, announced today.

Matthews made a personal survey of the wreck yesterday afternoon.

The Old Adams County Bank, of this city, has filed a petition, through their attorneys, in the Wells Circuit court for permission to sell some property in Wells county belonging to the Bank of Tocsin, for which the local bank is receiver.

The Tocsin bank closed its doors several days ago and the Decatur bank was appointed temporary receiver and later permanent receiver.

The land to be sold, if the petition passes, includes 40 acres in Jefferson township, Wells county, and the quarter lot on which the present Bank of Tocsin building is standing.

It has not yet been determined whether an assessment will have to be made on stockholders, but it is thought that the bank has more collectable paper and notes than was first believed.

## OPENING GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, June 4—Profit-taking caused easier prices in wheat at the opening of the Chicago board of trade today. Coarse grains, acting independently, made fractional gains.

Lower Liverpool cables and better crop outlook, created the selling pressure in wheat. Scattered showers brought additional moisture to the spring wheat country. Complaints of hot dry weather come from sections of the southwest.

The first weekly crop surveys to come into the pit this morning were decidedly bullish on corn. Commission houses were principal buyers basing their action on these reviews.

Oats followed corn. Trade was small and local in character.

Steady provisions reflected firm hogs and cables.

CHAPMAN GETS A  
REPRIEVE TODAYDate Of Execution Post-  
poned Until Dec. 3; Await  
Action On Appeal

Hartford, Conn., June 4—(United Press)—Gerald P. Chapman, "bandit prince," under sentence to die June 25 for the murder of a policeman, today was reprieved until Dec. 3.

The reprieve was issued by Governor Trumbull of Connecticut, on application of State's Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn, who prosecuted Chapman.

Alcorn pointed out to the governor that the case now is on appeal and that it will be impossible for the courts to pass on the appeal before he date set for Chapman's execution.

Recently a statement was given out by police officials to the effect that one of the witnesses admitted he had withheld information at Chapman's trial which was important to his alibi defense of the bandit. It was not known whether this played any part in the granting of the reprieve.
