Mitchell Sends Message To Legion Convention

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 6.—(United Press)—Colonel "Billy" Mitchell, former chief of air forces, unable to attend the American Legion convention here because of contractual proceedings in Washington, today telegraphed his former "buddies" asking them to aid him in his fight for a separate air department.

The message read by Captain Julius I. Peyser, department commander of the District of Columbia before the convention, follows:

"The time has come when we must modernize our national defense, teach our people what it means and organize it in a simple, direct and efficient manner. This can be brought about by creating a department of national defense, with sub-heads for the army, the navy and the air."

"It is one of the broadest questions before the country today. In the interest of economy and efficiency, it is not a question of persons or of political party. It is one which concerns the national security of this greatest of all nations."

WAR VETERANS ADDRESSED BY THE PRESIDENT

honorable dealings, and mutual agreements for a limitation of armaments among nations, than by any attempt at competition in squadrons and battalions."

At this point the President warned those who are trying to force a larger military establishment upon the country that "whenever the military power starts dictating to the civil authority, by whatever means adopted, the liberties of the country are beginning to end."

"Any organization of men in the military service bent on inflaming the public mind for the purpose of forcing government action through the pressure of public opinion is an exceedingly dangerous undertaking and precedent," he said.

Better Way To Spend Money.
Rather than spend money on unnecessary military expenditures, the President asked that it be turned to "the making of good roads, the building of better homes, the promotion of education, and all the other arts of peace."

Without mentioning the name of any specific organization, the President deplored the growing tendency of some to make racial and religious intolerance the cloak of a false Americanism.

"But among some of the varying racial religious, and social groups of our people there have been manifestations of an intolerance of opinion, a narrowness of outlook, a fixity of judgment, against which we may well be warned," he continued. This "inevitable disregard for the opinions and feeling of minorities is none the less a disturbing product of war psychology."

After reminding his hearers that the United States was founded as a refuge from religious persecution, and that patriotism does not depend upon

"whether one traces his Americanism back three centuries to the Mayflower, or three years to the steamer," Mr. Coolidge said:
