

PROBE ESCAPE OF WOMAN LIFER

Double Investigation Of Escape Of Mrs. Clara Carl In Progress

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 7.—(United Press)—A double investigation was in progress today into the circumstances attending the escape of Mrs. Clara Carl, 50, a lifer from the Indiana women's prison Saturday.

Miss Margaret Elliott, superintendent of the prison, who was absent at the time of the escape, questioned employees of the institution.

Police Chief Rikhoff sought to determine the cause of delay in notifying all patrolmen after the escape was reported.

No trace has been found of Mrs. Carl, who climbed over the prison wall and fled in broad daylight. She was convicted in the Shelby county court of poisoning her father-in-law and her husband and was given a life term.

Jap Reformers Launch Attack Upon White Slavery

Tokio, Oct. 7.—(United Press)—Japanese reformers have started a movement to eliminate the Yoshiwara, center of "white slavery" in the Orient.

Certain members of the Privy council have been approached by the reform leaders and have agreed to support the campaign for gradual elimination of white slavery on the basis of the League of Nation's convention for prohibition of the traffic in women and children for immoral purposes.

A section of the Council is reported in favor of approving the convention "with reservations" while others, including Dr. Baron Yamakawa, advocate full and immediate approval to "abolish the terrible national disgrace" of the Yoshiwara.

More than 150 social organizations are participating in the campaign which will be in full swing this month.

It may be explained that the Japanese hitherto have not looked upon red light districts with the same feeling as Westerners. In fact, heretofore a mother could legally sell her daughter into a house of the Yoshiwara; it was deemed simply a business transaction. And, sometimes the girl came out later with a comfortable income assured her, and without any brand of shame.

Laundry Owners Hold Convention At Chicago

Chicago, Oct. 7.—(United Press)—More than 1,500 citizens who make it their business to keep American clean met in their annual convention here today. They are members of the Laundry Owner's National association.

New laundry machines on exhibition included one with red and green light flashes similar to the traffic signs. The red light flashes when the clothes are wet and the green one when they are dry.

Delegates urged women to complete their emancipation by sending their laundry out or by using machines if they insist upon doing it themselves.

Prisoner Makes Escape From State Reformatory

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 7.—(United Press)—Raymond Powers, 21, a prisoner at the state reformatory at Pendleton, escaped last night from an operative of the Webster Detective agency while he was being taken to Green castle.

Powers was to have been used as a witness in a bank robbery trial there. Powers was clad in prison garb at the time of his escape.

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DAIRY EXPOSITION

Many Adams County Farmers And Business Men Plan To Attend Event At Indianapolis.

Farmer and business men from every community in Adams county have made arrangements for attending the 1925 National Dairy Exposition, held on the Indiana state fair grounds, Indianapolis, October 10 to 17, according to L. M. Busche, county agricultural agent.

Organized groups will accompany the county agent to the Exposition and while there will visit the exhibits of particular importance and value to them in the conduct of their farm work. The features of the Exposition that will be given the most consideration by the visitors from this county are the exhibits showing the value of the purebred sire in developing profitable producing herds on average farms, the cow testing association, better feeding methods, herd management and the mammoth display of every piece of machinery and equipment that has been devised to lessen labor and increase profit on the farm.

A list of many of the other important things to see at the Exposition are:

1. Thirteen hundred head of the finest purebred dairy cattle in America.

2. One hundred high-producing highly profitable grade dairy cows from cow testing associations.

3. One hundred pure bred dairy calves owned by boys and girls in calf clubs.

4. Outstanding examples of butter, cheese and other manufactured dairy products.

6. Contests, demonstrations and exhibits by and for boys and girls in dairy club clubs in all states.

7. The U. S. Department of Agriculture Exhibit, providing a complete short course in better dairying.

8. The Health Food Show, giving for the first time a definite classifi-

cation of the primal health foods for man.

9. A variety of agricultural exhibits and demonstrations to show what leading colleges are doing in educational, extension and research for dairying.

10. An immense array of scientific machinery and equipment used in the modern dairy plant for handling milk and its products.

11. A complete display of all modern appliances used by the American dairy farmer to produce and market more with more profit and less labor.

12. Exhibits and demonstrations of modern devices and improved methods for lessening the work of the housewife.

13. Agricultural students' contests in judging dairy cattle and products participated in by teams from thirty states.

14. Gatherings of men in every branch of the dairy industry.

15. The equipment and methods used in making rapid transportation of milk and its products from farm to consumer.

16. America's finest horse show—every evening.
