

"Old Ironsides" To Have Hour On Air October 17

Boston, Oct. 8.—"Old Ironsides" will have a full hour of the air on the night of October 17th when Curtis D. Wilbur, Secretary of the Navy, broadcasting through WCAP Washington hooked up to WJR Providence, WEEI Boston, WOO Philadelphia, WCAE Pittsburgh, WGR Buffalo, WWJ Detroit, WOC Davenport, WCCO Minneapolis and WSAI Cincinnati, will tell of the deeds and adventures of this famous historic treasure and formally open the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks' Campaign to raise \$500,000 to restore this old ship.

The program will open at 8:45 and following the announcement a naval band will give a concert for fifteen minutes and then the Secretary of the Navy will come on the air. The naval band will follow with another concert and then Robert Hilliard, the well known actor, will recite Oliver Wendell Holmes' poem "Old Ironsides." The Marine Band will close the program with a concert, concluding number being "The Star Spangled Banner."

In addition to this major program, the Elks in every part of the country, through the courtesy of the National Broadcaster's Association, have arranged during "Old Ironsides Week," October 19-24, for Elks orators to be

on the air every night to tell the story of this famous old ship and their efforts to save her through the children of the Nation. Hundreds of thousands of schools will stage patriotic exercises commemorative of the deeds and adventures of this old frigate and the early traditions of the American Navy.

District No. 5—L. R. T. Puckett, Evansville; Harold Ake, Bicknell; C. W. Deckard, Mitchell.

These men with the five board

members from each district complete the legislative body which will govern the great I. H. S. A. A. commencing October 22, when the first annual meeting under its jurisdiction will be held in the Manual Training-High School auditorium.

The board members are G. G. Ep-

pley, from No. 1; C. F. Albaugh, from No. 2; Roy Julian, No. 3; Lee O. Baird, No. 4, and John Adams, No. 5. This arrangement gives each district of the state four votes in the legislative body. A. L. Tester, of Anderson, permanent secretary, announced the election returns today.
