Coach Marshall Makes Several Shifts in Preparing For Portland Game

Several changes have been made in the lineup of the Yellow Jacket football team in preparation for the game with Portland high school at Portland, Saturday. Coach Marshall has shifted several players in hopes of strengthening the team. The backfield has been braced considerably with the return of "Red" Acker to the fold. BIG TEN TITLE SEASON OPENS

Indiana Plays Michigan And Chicago Meets Ohio State Saturday

Staff Correspondent) Chicago, Oct. 9.—The championship season for the Big Ten football conference of the middlewest will be opened tomorrow, Coach Stagg's Chicago Maroons defending their 1924 title against the onslaught of Ohio State and Michigan taking on Indiana at Ann Arbor.

Chicago uncovered none of its strength in defeating Kentucky over last week end and is expected to show plenty of new plays against the Buckeyes. Ohio is viewed as a possible contender, however, and should force the Maroons about to the limit. Indiana showed unexpected strength last Saturday in running up a 31 to 0 score against the state normal and may cause some trouble for "Hurry Up" Yost's Wolverines. Michigan, however, is the favorite.

While the other six members of the Big Ten will be engaged in games, none of them will have any bearing on the championship.

Illinois will have another opportunity to build up its strength by meeting Butler at Urbana. Iowa will take on St. Louis university at Iowa City; Minnesota meets Grinnell at Minneapolis; Northwestern will stand off the invasion of Carleton; Purdue's Boilermakers clash with DePauw; and Wisconsin's fast improving Badgers take on Franklin at Madison.

Outside of the conference, the most interesting game in the middlewest will be at South Bend where Knute Rockne's Irish team from Notre Dame takes on Beloit. It will be the last practice session for Notre Dame before the harder games on its schedule.

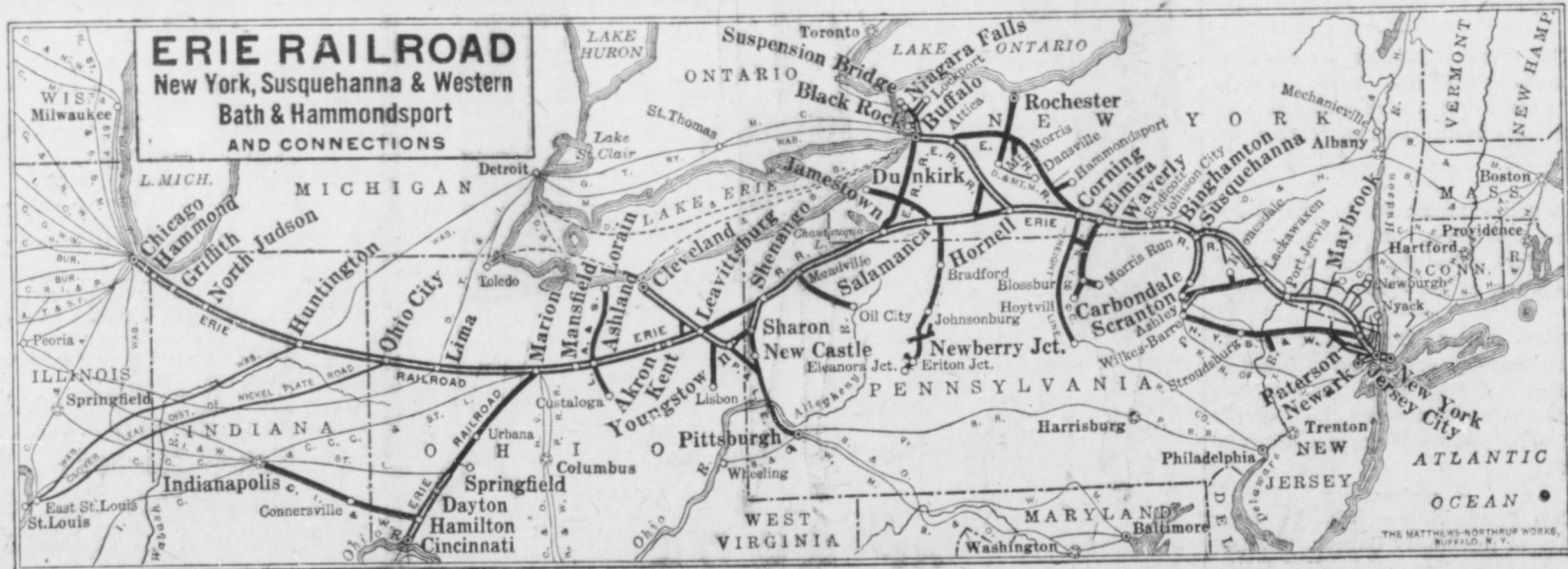

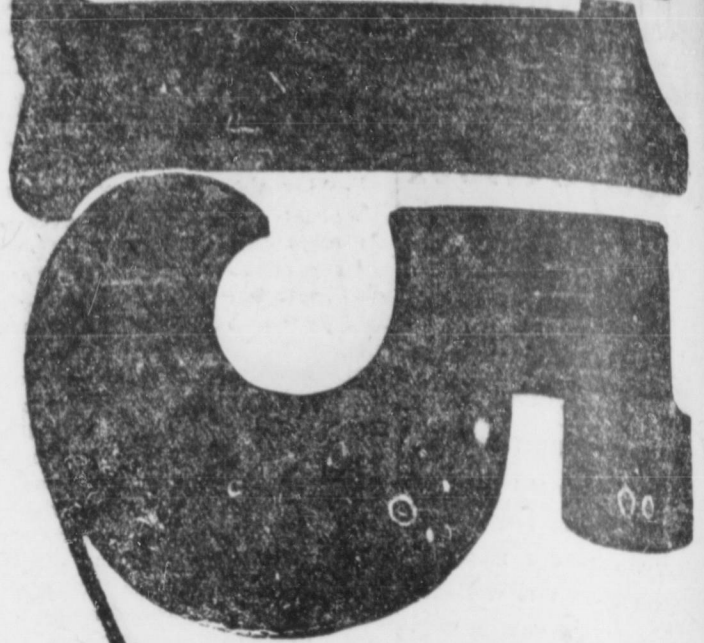

DIRECTIONS FOR TAKING SOIL SAMPLES
With a spade dig holes 6 inches deep at 4 or 5 places in the same field. Remove thin slice from the side of each hole. Mix together soils of the same type, dry and pulverize. About one pint of the dry soil should be brought in for testing each sample.
