## SEEKING MAN WHO AIDED MRS. CARL

### Detectives Grill Woman Who Escaped From Indiana Women's Prison

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—(United Press.)—Detectives today grilled Mrs. Clara Carl, "lifer" at the Indiana women's prison, in an effort to learn the identity of the man who aided her in escaping from the prison.

Mrs. Carl was recaptured at Columbus, O., after one week of freedom and brought back to the prison yesterday.

She admitted, detectives said, that a man was waiting outside the prison walls in an auto the afternoon of her escape to help her get away.

Under continued questioning she refused to name the man who assisted her. Mrs. Carl said the man drove her rapidly out of Indianapolis after she had climbed over the prison walls in broad daylight.

She left the auto in Hancock county but evaded prison authorities who searched in the vicinity of her former home in New Palestine for her.

Later Mrs. Carl went to Ohio and was arrested in Columbus as she was

boarding an interurban car.

The woman was sentenced from the Shelby county court to life imprisonment for the poisoning of her husband and father-in-law.

At the time of her escape, Mrs. Carl was working with chickens at the prison.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 12.—(United Press.)—Detectives today grilled Mrs. Clara Carl, "lifer" at the Indiana women's prison last week.

"I walked, begged rides, paid for rides and slept in the open the seven nights that I was free," Mrs. Carl said at the prison today.

"I slept in a bed one night when a farmer took me in, but I don't want to give his name for he was innocent."

"I walked until the blood ran from my toes when I took off my shoes. 'I was afraid to stay out and afraid to go in.'"

Mrs. Carl said the searchlights from automobiles along the roads filled her with fear.

She declared that finally she could stand the strain no longer and wrote the matron of the prison that she was returning as soon as she had seen her sister.

Mrs. Carl's desire to see her sister was thwarted. She was arrested in Columbus before reaching the sister's home.

## POPULATION OF CITIES ESTIMATED

### U. S. Census Bureau Issues Revised Figures For Cities Of Over 10,000

Washington, Oct. 12.—(United Press.)—Revised population figures for cities and towns of more than 10,000 population as of July 1, were announced by the United States census bureau today.

The estimates were based upon the assumption that the annual increase in the population of any city since 1920 is equal to the annual increase between 1910 and 1920.

Estimates of cities having more than 100,000 population were made several weeks ago and the list made public today contains new figures only for cities having less than that number.

Among them were:  
INDIANA:  
Bloomington 12,589; Clinton 13,642; Connersville 12,454; Crawfordsville 10,530; Evansville 93,601; Fort Wayne 7,846; Frankfort 13,051; Gary 76,870; Laporte 17,540; Michigan City 20,299; Muncie 32,491; Newcastle 16,955; Richmond 30,495; South Bend 80,691; Terre Haute 17,071; Vincennes 18,271.

In some cases no new estimates were made, the figures given being the same as in the 1920 census, while in others, no estimate was made because of the belief that despite all allowances it would not be correct. No figures were given for Iowa, South Dakota and some other states because of the recent state census made in them.

## EIGHT KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENTS

### Entire Family Of Three Wiped Out At Gary; Train Kills Few

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—(United Press.)—Eight dead is the toll of week in auto accidents in Indiana today.

At Gary an entire family of three was wiped out when a train hit an automobile in which Herbert Donnelly and his wife were riding with their daughter.

Grover Wilson was killed when he stepped in front of a train at Indiana harbor.

Charles F. Taylor was instantly killed when an automobile which he was driving to his wedding turned over near Columbia City.

Richard Bird died at a local hospital after being knocked from his bicycle by an automobile.

Lawrence Frye met death near Centerton when his automobile was hit by a Thiess traction car.

At Warsaw Maxan Phoebus was killed when he was struck by a train while walking across the tracks with his bicycle.
