SENATOR'S BODY TO LIE IN STATE AT HIS RESIDENCE

The burial will probably be Sunday. Ralston died at 11 o'clock last night after an illness of many months from heart and kidney disorders. Uremic poisoning was the direct cause of his death.

The end had been expected momentarily for the last few days. The senator dropped into a state of coma at midnight Tuesday night and never rallied.

At the bedside when he died were Mrs. Ralston, his two sons, Julian and Emmett, his daughter, Mrs. Ruth Larrue, his brother, Boyd M. Ralston, and two brothers and a sister of Mrs. Ralston.

Announcement of the death was made by Frederick Van Nuys, law partner of Ralston, who placed his name in the running for the presidential nomination at the democratic convention last year.

Ralston, who had been in failing health since his return from Washington at the close of congress last spring, had been confined to his bed since early in September.

He was 68 years old, having been born in Tuscarawas county, Ohio, in 1857. Most of his life was spent as a lawyer in Lebanon, Ind., where his rugged honesty and sincerity won him the leading place in his profession.

He was elected governor of Indiana in 1912 and served for four years. Retiring from the governorship in 1917 he entered an Indianapolis law firm and in 1922 was elected United States senator.

Friends of the deceased senator expressed the wish that his body lie in state at the state capitol before being taken to Lebanon. Members of the family will decide later whether this arrangement will be made.

While physicians had held no hope for his recovery for some time, Mrs. Ralston was overcome at his death. She had been in constant attendance at his bedside for days.

The period of unconsciousness from which he slipped quietly into death was the third one of his illness. The two previous lapses into coma were of short duration and physicians had hoped he would rally from the third.

Strong heart stimulants were administered to him throughout the day yesterday in an effort to revive him. He failed to respond to the stimulants, however.

Word of his death brought messages of condolence to the widow from old personal friends, democratic leaders and state officials.

Several intimate friends of the family went to the Ralston country home north of Indianapolis to be with Mrs. Ralston after his death.

The illness of Ralston explained for the first time to the general public his action in withdrawing his name from consideration as a presidential candidate at the democratic national convention last year at a time when victory was practically assured.

In withdrawing his name, Ralston

said that he was not desirous of receiving the honor, the highest gift of his party.

Though many assigned political reasons for the unprecedented act, his intimate friends knew that his physicians had told him he could not survive the strain of a political campaign.

Mrs. Ralston expressed a wish that the funeral services be conducted by Rev. A. C. Carmichael, who was pastor of the Christian Church at Lebanon when the Ralstons lived there.

An effort was being made to locate Rev. Carmichael, who is in the east.

On order of his physicians, Ralston declined all public speaking engagements during the summer, including an invitation to attend the centennial celebration at his birthplace in Ohio.

He was warned that any strenuous activity might bring a crisis in his condition.

Most of his time was spent at his country estate, "Hoosier Home," near here.

Locarno, Switzerland, Oct. 15.—

The action came shortly after the German delegation had announced its approval of the pact.

The German delegation made its announcement in plenary session. It was the first meeting of the conference which Foreign Ministers Benes and Skrzynski of Czechoslovakia and Poland, respectively, had attended.
