Colored Baptist Church In Chicago Is Bombed

Chicago, Oct. 16.—(United Press.)

—Another act of violence marked the negro "invasion" of the fashionable south side today.

Bethesda Baptist church, colored, a quarter million dollar structure, vacated several months ago through the consolidation of two Jewish temples, was wrecked by a bomb.

Damage is estimated at \$125,000. The entire south side was shaken by the blast.

For several years wealthy negroes have been making inroads on south side districts formerly occupied exclusively by wealthy whites. The former B'nai Shalom temple, however, is the farthest south the negroes have ever bought property. Their acquisition of the temple is believed to have enraged white property owners.

A smaller bomb exploded in the church shortly after the new owners had taken possession but did only minor damage.

their condolences.

Hundreds of telegrams were received by the widow, including one from President Coolidge.

"State and nation are poorer for his going as they are richer for his long life and useful service," said the telegram from the president.

Memorial services for Senator Ralston are planned for Monday by the Indianapolis Bar association and the State Bar association.

Dozens of civic and business organizations in Indianapolis and the state have adopted resolutions of sympathy for members of the Ralston family.

Flags on the state house and federal building in Indianapolis will remain at half mast until Ralston is buried.

The body will be taken from the Ralston home to Indianapolis by auto tomorrow. Special interurban cars will be run from Indianapolis to Lebanon for those going to the funeral.
