Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 16.—(United Press.)—Abolition of the railway labor board because of its futility and absolute uselessness in dealing with controversies arising between the men and management in transportation affairs, was urged in a resolution passed by the American Federation of Labor convention today.

The convention also unanimously adopted a resolution urging congressional investigation of the Bell Telephone system because of its "monopolistic grip," which "has become, year by year, more arrogant."
