## Hudson-Essex Line Announces Price Cut

P. Kirsch and Son, local distributors of the Hudson-Essex line, received word late last evening that the Hudson coach had been reduced to \$1,165, the Hudson brougham reduced to \$1,450 and the seven-passenger sedan to \$1,650. The new price on the Essex coach is \$765.

The local dealers state that the production of the Hudson company has been the largest in its history during the past year and that the concern ranked third in production of all American automobile manufacturers. According to factory bulletins the Hudson-Essex models will not be changed for the New York and Chicago shows.

## No Funds For Payment Of Wells Sheep Claims

Bluffton, Oct. 20.—County Auditor W. A. Woodward reports that the dog tax fund, from which payments are paid for damage done by dogs to flocks of sheep, has become exhausted and any future claims filed with the county commissioners cannot be paid until assessors make their collection of taxes next spring.

One reason for the early depletion of the dog fund is that the board of commissioners, acting under a new statute, reduced the dog taxes in Wells county from \$3 and \$5 to \$1 and \$3.

The Adams county dog tax levy was not lowered last spring, although several counties made a reduction similar to that in Wells county. The Adams county auditor has plenty of money on hand to pay claims for damage done by dogs in the county.

## Consider Beautification Of State House Grounds

Indianapolis, Oct. 20.—Plans are being considered for the beautification of the state house grounds it was announced today.

These plans include the planting of shrubs and bushes about in the grounds and a program of landscape gardening, which has been approved by the Indianapolis board of park commissioners.

Henry Roberts, secretary of state building and grounds committee and custodian of the state house also announced plans for the moving of the offices of the state board of health into the old Indiana University Medical school building.

## Arrest Of Bootleggers In Cities Up To Police

Indianapolis, Oct. 20.—Judge James Collins, in the Marion county criminal court holds that the sheriff's office should not be forced to arrest liquor law violators in the city of Indianapolis.

In a scathing attack on the inefficiency of the prohibition division of the police department Judge Collins said:

"I cast no reflection upon the sheriff's office for doing its duty, but the reflection is upon the police department for not doing its duty."

The attack was called forth when a number of residents appeared before the judge in connection with the arrest of a woman on a liquor charge and said that they were forced to call the sheriff before they could obtain action. The police were called several times prior to the calling of county officials it was said.

## Boy Takes Dad's Auto And \$1,500 And Starts On His Way To Florida

Gary, Ind., Oct. 20.—An Indiana Harbor restaurant owner today appealed to police to help locate his 15-year-old son.

The son disappeared with his father's auto and \$1,500 in cash. It is believed the boy may be on his way to Florida.

## VATICAN GETS CREDIT IN U. S.

American Finance Companies Grant \$1,500,000 Credit for the Vatican

(By Thomas B. Morgan, United Press Staff Correspondent)

Rome, Oct. 20.—An agreement has been reached between the Vatican and Blair and company and the Chase National bank of New York City, establishing a \$1,500,000 credit for the Vatican in New York.

The announcement was made exclusively through the United Press today.

Arrangements for the credit were consummated in a letter sent by the papal secretary, Cardinal Gasparri,

to the New York banks on Oct. 11, stating that the Vatican was delighted with agreement for credit with Blair and company, and also especially with the Chase National bank.

Cardinal Gasparri wrote that the conditions under which the credit was granted considering the exigencies of the market, were tempered by a sentiment of devotion to the Holy See.

His eminence, Cardinal Hayes of New York, has been authorized to sign the agreement on behalf of the Vatican.

## Unemployment on Decrease

Indianapolis, Oct. 20.—Unemployment in Indianapolis decreased 10.1 per cent between April and October, the local chamber of commerce announced today.

The present ratio of unemployment is very low, despite the increase in population, it was pointed out. The survey showed 1,250 industries located in the city.
