Buying in wheat assumed broader proportions. A statement by Secretary of Agriculture William A. Jardine added to bull sentiment growing out of unfavorable crop news from the southern hemisphere. The statement declared recent declines had probably discounted existing bear elements.
The corn trade continued to follow action in the wheat pit.
Oats held to an unchanged basis. Provisions dropped on packing house liquidation.

Former Wife Of Bob Fitzsimmons Facing Death In Charity Ward

Chicago, Oct. 21.—(United Press.)—Living only among the memories of fame and fortune that was hers when she was the able wife of Bob Fitzsimmons, world's champion heavyweight pugilist, Mrs. Phillip Heiner has become resigned to her fate—death in the charity ward of a Chicago hospital.

Mrs. Heiner married Fitzsimmons when he won the world's title. She was a little French girl, unable to speak a word of English. She came with Bob to this country and won some share of fame and fortune for herself on the musical comedy stage.

Then came differences and the couple was divorced. She later married Phillip Heiner but for more than three years has been estranged from him.

Much of the money she had earned on the stage was given to charities, principally in Los Angeles. Now, as she faces death from heart trouble, she is alone with her memories and dependent upon others' charities.

ROBINSON IS NEW SENATOR FROM INDIANA

in Marion county politics.

Throughout discussion on Ralston's successor, Robinson, Albert J. Beveridge, former United States senator, and Governor Jackson were considered the three men from whom the selection would probably be made.

Booms also developed for Frank Saul, Muncie manufacturer; Clyde Walb, republican state chairman; Evert Sanders, secretary to President Coolidge and Warren Fairbanks, Indianapolis newspaper publisher.

Robinson was called to the home of Governor Jackson early last night and informed of his appointment. The governor has been confined to his home since Sunday, with a severe cold.

Later Robinson went to the Columbia club, where he received the congratulations of republican leaders.

Mrs. Robinson was with him at the governor's home when the appointment was made.

Robinson was born in Pickerington, Ohio, in 1881. He attended the public schools in Pickerington and after graduation, taught school for a year and then entered Ohio Northern University at Ada, Ohio, where he obtained a bachelor's degree.

At the time he was a student at Ada, Frank Willis, and Simon Fess, now United States senators, were professors at the university.

Later Robinson moved to Indianapolis as the sales manager for a book firm but gave up the work to enter the Indiana university law school, from which he was graduated in 1910 as the valedictorian of his class.

After further study at the University of Chicago, Robinson took up law practice in Indianapolis.

He served a term in the state senate and held a superior court judgeship in Indianapolis for the unexpired term of Judge Clifford, who died in office.

Robinson sought the nomination

for senator in 1916 but was defeated. He served as a major of infantry in the World war.

Teachers To Open State Convention Tomorrow

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 21.—(United Press.)—The stage is all set for the opening session of the annual state teachers' convention here tomorrow.

Resolutions which will be presented to the convention have been drafted and tonight the teachers will begin arriving in the city for the sessions which will continue until Saturday.

The resolutions drafted by a committee which met last night urge teachers' support of state legislation, additional support for state schools engaged in training teachers, support of the economy unit plan, and concurrent meetings of the associations.


