Franklin Patterson, who pleaded guilty to a part in the robbery, testified that Jack used the machine in question.

"I had the key to the car all night," Mrs. Durand testified. "The first I knew about the White robbery was on the morning after it occurred. My housekeeper told me of the hold-up and said, 'Well, there is one robbery they can't charge against Jack.'"

The prosecution charged that Jack planned the robbery and that he and Patterson stayed outside the White home while James Miller, co-defendant in the case, snatched two necklaces and two diamond rings from Miss White as she was about to leave her room.


